

Housing

- ♦ The median value of owner-occupied housing (adjusted for inflation) was \$180,513 between 2014 and 2018, compared to \$195,784 in Idaho and \$208,613 in the US.
- The median value was the 14th highest out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2014 and 2018.
- ♦ The number of housing units increased by 6.7% from 2000 to 2018, compared to an increase of 34.8% in Idaho.




Income

- The county's per capita income in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$43,968, compared to the state average of \$44,696 and the national average of \$55,433.
- Per capita income increased by 9.1% from 2008 to 2018, compared to an increase of 15.3% in Idaho and an increase of 14.1% in the US.
- The median household income (adjusted for inflation) was \$48,546 in 2018 compared to \$56,530 in Idaho and \$63,059 in the US.



Hispanic Population

♦ Custer County had 203 Hispanic residents in 2018.



Age Structure

- ♦ 17.4% of Custer County's population was under 18 in 2018, in contrast to 25.5% in Idaho and 22.4% in the US.
- ♦ In 2018, 53.6% of the population was 18 to 64 years old, compared to 58.7% in Idaho and 61.5% in the US.
- ♦ Custer County's median age in 2018 was 52.7 compared to 36.6 in Idaho and 38.2 in the US.

Note: The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of inflation. Using the CPI to put dollar values in "real" terms makes it easier to see "inflation-free" change over time. Our base year is 2019, which means all dollar values are in terms of 2019 dollars.






- ◆ Custer County's total population in 2018 was 4,280.
- ♦ In 2018, the median household income was \$48,546.
- ◆ Custer County's average annual unemployment rate was 4.0% in 2018.
- ♦ In 2018, Hispanic residents made up 4.7% of the population, compared to 12.7% in Idaho and 18.3% in the US.




Population Change

- Custer County had 4,280 residents in 2018, 88 less than 2010.
- Population decreased by 2.0 percent between 2010 and 2018, compared to an increase of 11.9 percent in Idaho as a whole.





- Custer County was the 42nd fastest growing county out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2010 and 2018.
- Since 1970, Custer County has gained 1,313 residents.
- Custer County had migration & natural change rates that were below the state average between 2010 and 2018.




Employment

- ◆ The average annual unemployment rate in 2018 was 4.0%, compared to 2.8% for Idaho and 3.9% for the US. Custer County ranked 12th—from highest to lowest—out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ♦ The largest number of jobs in 2018 were provided by government, farming, and accommodation and food services.
- ♦ The number of jobs was 2,809 in 2018, compared to 1,286 in 1969—a 118% increase.

- ♦ In 2018, the self-employment rate was 42.4%, compared to 25.7% for Idaho and 23.1% for the US.
- ♦ The average wage per job in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$32,363, down from \$41,618 a decade earlier. The average was \$43.659 in Idaho and \$58.304 in the US.



Social Trends

Educational Attainment

In Custer County on average between 2014-2018...

- ◆ 10.6% of the population 25 years and older had no high school diploma, compared to 9.4% in Idaho and 12.3% in the US.
- ◆ 23.0% had a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 26.9% in Idaho and 31.5% in the US.

Poverty

- ◆ Custer County's overall poverty rate increased from 13.3% in 2008 when the recession began to 14.7% in 2018.
- Statewide, the overall poverty rate in 2018 was 11.7% and the US rate was 13.1%.
- Custer County's child poverty rate (for people under 18) increased from 19.9% in 2008 when the recession began to 23.2% in 2018.
- ♦ On average between 2014 and 2018, the poverty rate for people 65 and over was 11.4 percent.

Custer County Youth

- ◆ The teen birth rate in 2016 was 18 per 1,000, compared to 10 per 1,000 in Idaho and 9 per 1,000 in the US.
- On average between 2014 and 2018, teens who were not working, looking for work, and not in school made up 12.2% of all youth aged 16-19, compared to 6.8% in Idaho and 6.8% in the US.

Crime and Law Enforcement

In Custer County in 2017...

- The total number of crimes reported was 58 per 10,000 population, compared to 186 in Idaho and 236 in the US.
- ◆ The number of sworn police officers per 1,000 population was 1.9, compared to 1.7 in Idaho and 2.1 in the US.
