

Housing

- ♦ The median value of owner-occupied housing (adjusted for inflation) was \$158,623 between 2014 and 2018, compared to \$195,784 in Idaho and \$208,613 in the US.
- The median value was the 24th highest out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2014 and 2018.
- ♦ The number of housing units increased by 13.3% from 2000 to 2018, compared to an increase of 34.8% in Idaho.




Income

- The county's per capita income in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$35,872, compared to the state average of \$44,696 and the national average of \$55,433.
- Per capita income decreased by 1.6% from 2008 to 2018, compared to an increase of 15.3% in Idaho and an increase of 14.1% in the US.
- The median household income (adjusted for inflation) was \$53,555 in 2018 compared to \$56,530 in Idaho and \$63,059 in the US.



Hispanic Population

Oneida County had 210 Hispanic residents in 2018.



Age Structure

- ♦ 28.3% of Oneida County's population was under 18 in 2018, in contrast to 25.5% in Idaho and 22.4% in the US.
- ♦ In 2018, 51.4% of the population was 18 to 64 years old, compared to 58.7% in Idaho and 61.5% in the US.
- ♦ Oneida County's median age in 2018 was 40.0 compared to 36.2 in Idaho and 37.9 in the US.

Note: The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of inflation. Using the CPI to put dollar values in "real" terms makes it easier to see "inflation-free" change over time. Our base year is 2019, which means all dollar values are in terms of 2019 dollars.




COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Oneida County's total population in 2018 was 4,488.
- ♦ In 2018, the median household income was \$53,555.
- ◆ Oneida County's average annual unemployment rate was 2.2% in 2018.
- ♦ In 2018, Hispanic residents made up 4.4% of the population, compared to 12.3% in Idaho and 17.8% in the US.




Population Change

- Oneida County had 4,488 residents in 2018, 202 more than 2010.
- Population increased by 4.7 percent between 2010 and 2018, compared to an increase of 11.9 percent in Idaho as a whole.



- Oneida County was the 19th fastest growing county out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2010 and 2018.
- Since 1970, Oneida County has gained 1,624 residents.
- Oneida County had migration & natural change rates that were below the state average between 2010 and 2018.




Employment

- The average annual unemployment rate in 2018 was 2.2%, compared to 2.8% for Idaho and 3.9% for the US. Oneida County ranked 40th—from highest to lowest—out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ♦ The largest number of jobs in 2018 were provided by farming, government, and retail trade.
- ♦ The number of jobs was 2,462 in 2018, compared to 1,536 in 1969—a 60% increase.

- ♦ In 2018, the self-employment rate was 43.7%, compared to 25.7% for Idaho and 23.1% for the US.
- ♦ The average wage per job in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$27,846, up slightly from \$27,426 a decade earlier. The average was \$43,659 in Idaho and \$58,304 in the US.



Social Trends

Educational Attainment

In Oneida County on average between 2014-2018...

- ♦ 9.0% of the population 25 years and older had no high school diploma, compared to 9.4% in Idaho and 12.3% in the US.
- ◆ 15.5% had a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 26.9% in Idaho and 31.5% in the US.

Poverty

- ◆ Oneida County's overall poverty rate decreased from 11.7% in 2008 when the recession began to 11.3% in 2018.
- Statewide, the overall poverty rate in 2018 was 11.7% and the US rate was 13.1%.
- Oneida County's child poverty rate (for people under 18) decreased from 16.6% in 2008 when the recession began to 14.9% in 2018.
- ♦ On average between 2014 and 2018, the poverty rate for people 65 and over was 8.0 percent.

Oneida County Youth

- ♦ The teen birth rate in 2013 was 10 per 1,000, compared to 9 per 1,000 in Idaho and 12 per 1,000 in the US.
- On average between 2012 and 2016, teens who were not working, looking for work, and not in school made up 8.1% of all youth aged 16-19, compared to 7.6% in Idaho and 7.3% in the US.

Crime and Law Enforcement

In Oneida County in 2018...

- ◆ The total number of crimes reported was 107 per 10,000 population, compared to 169 in Idaho and 258 in the US.
- The number of sworn police officers per 1,000 population was 1.8, compared to 1.6 in Idaho and 2.1 in the US.
