Yes! Pine Trees Dropping Needles in Autumn is Normanl

Homeowners will often see the needles on their evergreen trees turning brown and falling off in the late summer or fall. Needle drop on pine trees is a naturally occurring phenomena. If pine needles turn brown from the interior of the tree, and outer needles stay green, there is no cause for alarm. Most people know that deciduous trees such as cottonwood, oak or maple trees lose their leaves in the fall, but fewer people understand that evergreen trees also lose their old needles. Mental Health Tip of the Month

Tackling a New Year's resolution can be pretty daunting. Here's two helpful tips on how you can keep yours.

- 1. Be specific. Although "losing weight", "budget better", and "exercise more" are great goals, they lack specificity of how you are going to achieve your goal. Adding specifics like lose X amount of weight or spend X amount less will actually help you achieve goals faster.
- 2. Try splitting your goal in half. Goals often derail due to discouragement from not accomplishing them, so splitting them in half can provide motivation as you'll see progress much faster.
- 3. Don't get discouraged when progress doesn't seem like it is happening all at once. Remember that regardless of which goal you make small steps can help you achieve them.
