Welcome to Our Newsletter!

This newsletter is a new way to share infuriation on what is happening in the University of Idaho Extension office in Canyon County. You are receiving a copy of it because you have expressed interest in learning about one or more of our educational program areas. This letter will be sent out monthly and contains information on all the program areas in our county.

All About Extension: Canyon County Extension provides programming for five areas of education. Those categories include; 4-H Youth Development, Crops, Small Acreage & Livestock, Horticulture, and Family & Consumer Sciences. Each program area is supported by a University of Idaho Educator. The purpose of Extension programming is to bring the knowledge and research of the University of Idaho to you, where you live, when it's convenient for you. This is done by providing community programming to the community. The first week of October is National 4-H Week. 4-H is delivered by Extension - a community of more than 100 public universities across the nation that provide experiences where youth learn by doing. Youth complete hands-on projects in areas like health, science, agriculture and citizenship. 4-H provides a positive environment where they receive guidance from adult mentors and are encouraged to take on proactive leadership roles. Canyon County 4-H Youth Development programs have been ongoing since the first Extension agent was hired in 1913. In fact, the 1st 4-H club leader in the state was from Canyon County.

Youth in 4-H and Extension programs are 2x more likely to give back to their community and make healthier choices. In 2022 8,680 Canyon County youth were empowered to give back to their community, county and world.

ZSuite is Now OPEN for Enrollment!

As of October 1, all 4-H enrollment will be rolled over to an inactive status. Zsuites is open for Members and volunteers to begin re-enrolling at 4h.zsuite.org.

Once a member has completed the online enrolled AND paid their member fees (\$25/member or \$32/horse member) they will be made active. Remember to select ALL PROJECTS you will be participating in when enrolling.

Pet-Safe Gardening this Fall

What do Lilies, Tulips, Azaleas, and Daffodils have in common besides being favorites in the garden? They are toxic to pets. Keep you pets in mind when planning your garden! You will both be much happier with the end result. There are tons of options when it comes to mulch, plants, and pest management, but some of those options are deadly to your pets. The ASPCA has a highly inclusive list of toxic and non-toxic plants for dogs, cats, and horses too. Penn State has some really good ideas for pet-scaping and pet friendly gardens. Most importantly, do your research and plan before putting anything in your garden. Watch this short video where Kelly McGowan, horticulture specialist with MU Extension, talks about keeping dogs like Buddy safe around plants.



Jelly, Jam, Preserves, and Marmalade

Fresh, spreadable fruit in the form of jam, jelly, preserves, or marmalade, might possibly be summer's sweetest reward. The best part is that they are easy to make and can be enjoyed long after you put your garden to bed. So, what is the difference between each of these spreadable options? Before we dive in, it helps to know that there are two main factors that turn fruit into a thick, spreadable texture: heat (from cooking) and pectin. When fruit is heated, it will lose liquid, causing the fruit to reduce to a firmer state. Pectin is naturally-occurring in fruit and happens to also make fruit thicken when cooked. However, not all fruit contains enough pectin to reach a firm texture, so many spreadable fruit recipes call for additional pectin. There were 5.4 days of suitable for fieldwork in Idaho, equal to the 5.4 days reported the previous week. Central Idaho had average temperatures. Jerome and Twin Falls Counties experienced rain early in the week, which slowed field activity. The fourth cutting of alfalfa hay was noted to have substantial rain damage. The main sugarbeet harvest was underway despite challenging conditions. The first corn combines were sighted over the week. Potato harvest continued after fields dried out. Fremont, Madison and Teton Counties experienced some frost and heavy rain on Tuesday,
