	Learn about the different types of jewelry making. All jewelry at this level will be made from ready-made materials including kits.	Completed	Ву	
2.	Learn to identify and use different types of jewelry making tools such as a crimper, needle nose pliers and wire cutters.			
3.	Learn about complimentary and opposite colors on a color wheel and use them in your jewelry.			
4.	Learn how to use clasps and closures on your jewelry.			
5.	Learn and use different types of stringing material such as wire, elastic, string, leather, thread and ribbon.			
6.	Learn how to knot when beading.			
7.	Learn how to make simple earrings.			
8.	In your demonstration, explain jewelry methods you used on each piece you display at fair.			
9.	Display 3 pieces on a 15" by 15" display board, either covered in grey or black material, at the fair. Make sure jewelry is securely fastened to board. An example of 3 pieces would be: necklace, bracelet and earrings or necklace and 2 sets of earrings.

1.	Learn and list 3 new ways to make jewelry.			
2.	Expand on the materials and techniques used in your beading such as ribbon or metal as well as different types of stringing materials. At least one fair display piece must include one of the new materials.			
3.	Explore and find new patterns online or other sources for making jewelry. Use a published pattern on one of your fair display pieces. Include your pattern in an envelope taped to the back of your display board.			
4.	Design your own pattern for 1 piece of fair displayed			

jewelry. Include your pattern.

5.	In your demonstration, explain each technique and method used in your fair display pieces.		
6.	Display 3 pieces on a 15" by 15" display board, either covered in grey or black material, at the fair. Make sure jewelry is securely fastened to board. All jewelry at this level must have a pattern and show 2 or more different techniques such as: wire wrapping, fimo clay, bead looming, knotting, craft jewelry, etc.		Approved

	eeding to level 3. Members will explore advanced jewelry techniques and will design all of their own jewelry using a variety of materials and methods. All pieces must have a pattern.		
2.	In your demonstration, explain technique, methods and materials used for each fair display piece.		
3.	Display 4 pieces on a 15' by 15' display board, either covered in grey or black material, at the fair. Make sure jewelry is securely fastened to board. Jewelry at this level must demonstrate increased difficulty over the previous year. Patterns must be securely attached to the back of the board in an envelope.		

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
