## Career Opportunities

A bachelor's degree in organizational sciences will help you become a better organizational communicator and leader. It has become increasingly evident that many problems in the workplace are the result of relationship failures.

capabilities and training needs, and lack of concern for both employee and manager professional development.

## Undergraduate Degree Requirements:

- 128 semester credits, and a final GPA of 2.50 or higher
- 36 upper division (300-400 level) credits
- At least 32 of your upper division credits must come from the University of Idaho
- A maximum of 70 hours from a community college can be applied toward a bachelor's degree.
- Complete that State Board of Education Core requirements or an Associate's degree (A.A. or A.S.); the College of Letter's Arts, and Social Sciences requirements for a B.A. or B.S.; and the Organizational Sciences major requirements.
