

Idaho Youth Horse Contests

General Information

The Idaho Youth Horse Contests are state level events held annually for eligible 4-H, FFA, and other Idaho youth. Contests will be held July 6 and 7, 2011 in Blackfoot, Idaho. This is the 40st State Horse Judging Contest, 28th State Horse Bowl Contest, the 25th State Horse Demonstration and Public Speaking Contest and the 3th State Hippology Contest. All contests will be held in accordance with the "Idaho Youth Horse Contest Guidelines."

Housing and Facilities – Team members are responsible for their own transportation to and from the contests. A sample listing of lodging accommodations can be found at the end of this publication (no endorsements are implied). Each county extension office and District Extension Representative will receive an electronic copy of this document for distribution to qualifying teams/individuals; additional copies can also be obtained on the University of Idaho 4-H Youth Development website. For additional information contact Scott Nash or Debbie White at the Bingham County Extension Office (208) 785-8060.

Insurance – Counties are required to verify that all participants are covered by accident insurance before attending the State Contest.

Grievances – Any protest must be submitted in writing (along with a \$25 deposit) at least one hour prior to the scheduled awards presentation. Protests will be reviewed by a three-member Grievance Committee. Deposits will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. **Decisions of the Grievance Committee are FINAL.**

Dress Code – Appropriate English or Western attire must be worn by PARTICIPANTS throughout all contests and awards presentations. Accepted English attire includes: breeches/jodhpurs, tall or short hard-soled boots, shirt with collar, and jacket; derby hat or helmet is optional. Accepted Western attire includes: long pants and belt, western hard-soled boots, and long sleeved shirt with collar, which must be tucked into pants; western hat or helmet is optional (Oral Presentation contestants may choose appropriate dress for their subject). Any questions regarding attire may be addressed to the Contest Committee prior to contest start. Violations of attire rules will result in disqualification, including during the awards presentation.

Code of Conduct

All contestants, coaches, parents and spectators are expected to conduct themselves in an appropriate manner at all times (in accordance with the *Idaho 4-H Code of Conduct*). At no time will disrespectful behavior toward contest officials, other contestants, coaches, or the general public be tolerated. Failure to comply may result in immediate disqualification of any individuals and/or teams.

Idaho Youth Horse Contests

Judging Contest

The Idaho Youth Horse Judging Contest is an educational experience that gives youth a greater understanding of horse selection and performance evaluation. Participants gain experience in the decision-making process by determining and ranking four horses in a class from the most desirable to the least desirable traits/performance. Participants develop speaking skills through individually presenting an oral defense of their placing.

The state contest determines qualification for national events. It is open to only those who qualify from counties and districts in Idaho. Youth may participate as individuals or as team members.

Objectives

- Teach youth the principles of horse selection and performance evaluation as related to equine recreational activities.
- Stimulate youth achievement by providing the opportunity for a competitive learning experience in an area of their special interest.
- Help youth develop positive attitudes about their own abilities and their relationships with others.

Eligibility

Each of the four 4-H Extension Districts may enter the following:

(All participants, whether individuals or team members, must be included on the official entry.)

- Ten individuals in each of the three age divisions.
- Ten teams.

The participants must be currently enrolled in a 4-H project or be a member of an organized horse-interest youth group approved by the District Extension Representative. Team members may be of mixed ages but must belong to the same club, county or group. Contestants must fall within one of the three age divisions listed below to be eligible.

The age divisions for this Idaho Youth Horse Judging Contest are determined by the contestant's age on January 1, 2011:

Junior	8 - 10 years old
Intermediate	11 - 13 years old
Senior	14 - 18 years old (or still in high school)

Entries

The District Extension Representative will authorize individuals and teams from their District and submit one official entry form (provided) listing all qualified teams and individuals to the State Contest Committee on or before June 24, 2011. No substitutions of pre-registered individuals or teams may be made after the entry deadline. District designees are responsible for verification of contestant's ages. The contest committee will not be responsible for inaccurate entries. Contestants may compete on only one team.

Entry fees for the Horse Judging Contest are **\$15.00 per contestant** (includes lunch). All monies must accompany entries. Mail entries to: Bingham County Extension, 583 W Sexton St, Blackfoot, ID, 83221.

Contest Procedure

The Idaho Youth Horse Judging Contest will be held July 6, 2011, at the Eastern Idaho State Fairgrounds, Blackfoot, ID. Registration will be from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. An orientation session for contestants and coaches will be held from 8:30 to 9:00 a.m., with the judging contest starting promptly at 9:00 a.m.

Contestants will judge seven classes of horses, consisting of four halter classes and three performance classes. Reason classes will be announced during the orientation session. After completing the judging classes, contestants will give two sets of oral reasons.

An official will determine the final placing. Placing of halter classes will be based on conformation and action; all halter horses are judged as sound of wind, limb and breeding. In performance classes the horse and rider will be judged on the basis of performance as they appear, all tack is considered legal. *Halter classes may be selected from light horse breeds, draft horses and/or mules. Performance classes may include: Equitation, Pleasure, Reining, Driving, Trail, Hunter Hack, or Western Riding.*

After all classes have been judged and contestants' reasons given, the judge(s) will give the official placing and oral reasons for each class.

Contest Rules

Contestants are expected to abide by these judging contest rules:

1. No talking during the contest.
2. No printed material may be taken into the contest.
3. Be quick and courteous in response to group leader directions.
4. Stay with group until dismissed.
5. Refrain from conduct that would distract fellow contestants.

Rule violations may constitute a zero for that class, or dismissal from the contest. These rules will be enforced.

Awards and Recognition

Ribbons will be presented to the top ten teams and the top ten individuals in each of the three age divisions.

Further Competition

The top five 4-H teams may attend one regional or national horse judging contest within one year of the 2011 Idaho Youth Horse Judging Contest, provided they meet the following criteria:

Procedure

1. Each team must meet the specific contest eligibility regarding member age, club enrollment, etc.
2. Winning teams will select the contest they wish to attend according to their rank in the state contests: i.e. first team gets first choice; second team gets second choice, etc.
3. Selections will be authorized and entries will be verified by the State 4-H Office
4. Fund raising must be coordinated with their local Extension Office.
5. The team must be accompanied by one adult. Teams pay all expenses. Those teams from counties that have contributed 2011 horse member fees to the Idaho 4-H Youth Horse Council by June 1, 2011 may be eligible to receive some travel funds.
6. Transportation arrangements will be made by team members and their parents.

Idaho Youth Horse Contest

Hippology Contest

Hippology (Greek meaning horse knowledge) contests provide a format for youth to demonstrate their level of understanding and breadth of knowledge of horse management and use. Testing formats include written exams, demonstrations of practical skills, animal evaluation, and oral presentations. As such, a variety of learning abilities and life skills are demonstrated. It is intended to be fun, friendly and a rewarding experience for the participants.

The State Contest determines qualification for national events. It is open to only those who qualify from counties and districts in Idaho. Youth may participate only as a team.

The Hippology contest has four (4) phases:

1. Quiz Phase
2. Station Phase
3. Judging Phase
4. Team Problem Phase/Presentation

Eligibility

Each 4-H Extension District can send up to five (5) teams in each division (Junior and Senior), which will consist of not more than four members. Selection method will be determined by the District.

There will be two age divisions, and each age division will be considered a separate contest.

Junior Division: 8-13, as of January 1 of the current year

Senior Division: 14-18, as of January 1 of the current year

Mixed aged teams will be allowed, the age of the oldest member of the team will determine which division the team competes in. The participants must be currently enrolled in a 4-H project or be a member of an organized horse-interest youth group approved by the District Extension Representative.

Entries

The District Extension Representative will submit one official entry form (provided) listing all qualified teams to the state contest committee on or before **June 24, 2011**. Age verification of contestants is the responsibility of the District Director designee. No substitutions of pre-registered individuals or teams may be made after the registration deadline.

Entry fees for the Hippology Contest are **\$15.00 per team member**. All monies must accompany entries. Mail entries to: **Bingham County Extension, 583 W Sexton St, Blackfoot, ID 83221**. If youth are participating in both Horse Judging and Hippology Contest, the fee will be reduced by \$5.00.

Contest Procedure

The Idaho Youth Hippology Contest will be held on July 6 & 7, 2011. Check in on Wednesday, July 6, will be at 7:30 a.m. at the Eastern Idaho State Fairgrounds in Blackfoot, ID. The contest will begin at 9:00 a.m. Contestants will complete the Judging Phase of the competition. The Quiz will be conducted at 2:00 p.m. . An orientation session for contestants and coaches will be held from 8:30 to 9:00 a.m., with the judging contest starting promptly at 9:00 a.m.

Contestants will judge four classes of horses, consisting of two halter classes and two performance classes.

An official will determine the final placing. Placing of halter classes will be based on conformation and action; all halter horses are judged as sound of wind, limb and breeding. In performance classes, the horse and rider will be judged on the basis of performance as they appear, all tack is considered legal. *Halter classes may be selected from light horse breeds, draft horses and/or mules. Performance classes may include: Equitation, Pleasure, Reining, Driving, Trail, Hunter Hack, or Western Riding.*

On Thursday, July 7 at the Eastern Idaho State Fairgrounds in Blackfoot, Idaho, The contestants will complete the Station Phases and the Team Problems portion of the competition. Check-in will be on Thursday, July 7 at 1:00 p.m. with the contest beginning at 1:15 p.m.

Awards and Recognition

- Awards will be presented to the top individuals in each of the three phases for both the Junior and Senior Division.
- Awards will be presented to the top five (5) individuals for overall scores in both the Junior and Senior Division
- Awards will be presented to the top three (3) teams, overall, in both the Junior and Senior Divisions

Further Competition

The top two Senior Teams may represent Idaho at a national Hippology contest within one year of the 2011 Idaho Youth Horse Judging Contest. Mixed age teams are ineligible to attend national contest.

Procedure

1. Each team must meet the specific contest eligibility regarding member age, club enrollment, etc.
2. Winning teams will select the contest they wish to attend according to their rank in the state contests: i.e. first team gets first choice; second team gets second choice, etc.
3. Selections will be authorized and entries will be verified by the State 4-H Office
4. Fund raising must be coordinated with their local Extension Office.
5. The team must be accompanied by one adult. Teams pay all expenses. Those teams from counties that have contributed 2011 horse member fees to the Idaho 4-H Youth Horse Council by June 1, 2011 may be eligible to receive some travel funds.
6. Transportation arrangements will be made by team members and their parents.

Idaho Youth Horse Contest

Horse Bowl Contest

The State Youth Horse Bowl Contest is based on quick memory recall of information. Quick response, although important in the contest, may not be a true indication of a participant's knowledge of horses.

Objectives

- Provide an opportunity for youth to demonstrate their knowledge of equine related subject matter.
- Stimulate youth achievement by providing the opportunity for a competitive learning experience in an area of their special interest.
- Provide an educational program that serves as an incentive to individual learning.

Eligibility

Each of the four 4-H Extension Districts may enter three teams. Selection method will be determined by the District.

A Horse Bowl team shall consist of four members. One alternate team member may also be selected. There will be two age divisions, and each age division will be considered a separate contest.

Junior Division: 8-13, as of January 1 of the current year

Senior Division: 14-18, as of January 1 of the current year

Mixed aged teams will be allowed, the age of the oldest member of the team will determine which division the team competes in. Members must be currently enrolled in a 4-H horse project or a member of an organized horse-interest youth group approved by the Extension District Director designee.

Entries

The District Extension Representative will submit one official entry form (provided) listing all qualified teams to the state contest committee on or before June 24, 2011. Age verification of contestants is the responsibility of the District Extension Representative. No substitutions of pre-registered individuals or teams may be made after the registration deadline.

Entry fees for the Horse Bowl Contest are **\$10.00 per team member**. All monies must accompany entries. Mail entries to: **Bingham County Extension, 583 W. Sexton St. Blackfoot, ID 83221.**

Contest Procedure

The State Youth Horse Bowl Contest will be held on Thursday, July 7, at the Eastern Idaho State Fairgrounds. Check-in for teams and coaches will be at 9:30 a.m. The contest will begin at 10:00 a.m.

A random drawing of registered teams will determine first round matches. This will be announced at the registration table. Study rooms will be set up for teams where they will remain until the teams/coaches are escorted to the game room.

Awards will be presented to the top five individuals in both the Junior and Senior Divisions.

Further Horse Bowl Competition

The top two Senior Division scoring 4-H teams may choose to attend further competition at regional or national levels. Mixed aged teams are not eligible to attend a national contest.

Procedure

1. Each team must meet the specific contest eligibility regarding member age, club enrollment, etc.
2. Winning teams will select the contest they wish to attend according to their rank in the state contests: i.e. first team gets first choice; second team gets second choice, etc.
3. Selections will be authorized and entries will be verified by the State 4-H Office
4. Fund raising must be coordinated with their local Extension Office.
5. The team must be accompanied by one adult. Teams pay all expenses. Those teams from counties that have contributed 2011 horse member fees to the Idaho 4-H Youth Horse Council by June 1, 2011 may be eligible to receive some travel funds.
6. Transportation arrangements will be made by team members and their parents.

Idaho Youth Horse Contests

Horse Oral Presentation Contest General Information

The Idaho Youth Horse Oral Presentation Contests are educational experiences allowing youth to further develop their abilities to relate their skills and knowledge of the horse industry to others. A contestant may participate in only one category of these contests each year: Individual Demonstration/Illustrated Talk, Team Demonstration/Illustrated Talk, and Public Speaking.

Objectives

1. To provide an opportunity for youth to express their knowledge of equine science and husbandry.
2. To develop within youth interested in the horse industry the ability to speak confidently before the public.

These contests will be held on July 7 at the Eastern Idaho State fairgrounds in Blackfoot, Idaho. Contestant check-in is at 8:00 a.m. The various contests start at 8:30 a.m.

Entries

The District Extension Representative designee will submit one official entry form (provided) listing all qualified individuals and/or teams to the state contest committee on or before June 24, 2011 and must include the following:

1. Name, age, county
2. Contest category:
 - Individual Demonstration/Illustrated Talk
 - Team Demonstration/Illustrated Talk
 - Public Speaking
3. Title/topic of the presentation
4. An entry fee of **\$10.00 per contestant** must accompany entry. Please mail to: Bingham county Extension, 583 W. Sexton St., Blackfoot, Idaho 83221. Substitutions of pre-registered contestants are not permitted after the registration deadline.

Further Competition

The top two Senior Division contestants in each of the three categories may choose to attend further competition at regional or national levels. Those attending a national or regional competition may not have participated in any previous post-secondary training or competition in public speaking or not previously have competed in the same contest area (Demonstration or Public Speaking) at either the Eastern or Western 4-H National Contest or other national contest.

1. Each team must meet the specific contest eligibility regarding member age, club enrollment, etc.
2. Winning individuals or teams will select the contest they wish to attend according to their rank in the state contests: i.e. first team gets first choice; second team gets second choice, etc.
3. Selections will be authorized and entries will be verified by the State 4-H Office
4. Fund raising must be coordinated with their local Extension Office.
5. The team must be accompanied by one adult. Teams pay all expenses. Those individuals or teams from counties that have contributed 2011 horse member fees to the Idaho 4-H Youth Horse Council by June 1, 2011 may be eligible to receive some travel funds.
6. Transportation arrangements will be made by team members and their parents.

Idaho Youth Horse Contests

Demonstrations/ Illustrated Talks

Eligibility

Contestants must be members of 4-H or of an organized horse interest group approved by the District Extension Representative. Contestants must be at least 8 and not more than 18 years of age (or still in high school) on January 1, 2010.

Presenters will be divided into five groups:

- Group 1 - Individual Junior 8 - 10 years of age**
- Group 2 - Individual Intermediate 11 - 13 years of age**
- Group 3 - Individual Senior 14 - 18 years of age**
- Group 4 - Team members, Junior 13 years of age and under**
- Group 5 - Team members, Senior 14- -18 years of age**

(In team demonstrations, the age of the oldest presenter will determine which age division they are to compete in.)

Each Extension 4-H District may enter 15 individual demonstrations/ illustrated talks and 10 team demonstrations/illustrated talks in this competition. Contestants may be selected by any method determined by the District.

Equipment

The contest committee will provide an easel and table. All other arrangements are the responsibility of the contestant. Use of creative audio/visual aids is permitted, but the contestant must have been involved in making them. A public address system will not be used.

Contest Procedure

This contest includes demonstrations or illustrated presentations (no live animals will be permitted). Contestant order will be determined by random drawing.

The length of the presentations must be:

- * **5 to 8 minutes for 8 to 13 year olds**
- * **10 to 15 minutes for 14 to 18 year olds**
- * **10 to 15 minutes for team demonstrations.**

Each judge will deduct 1 point for each minute, or fraction of a minute, either under or over the prescribed times. The use of notes is permitted. However, judges at their discretion may deduct points for excessive use of notes.

During the event, contestants may introduce themselves by name, county, and demonstration topic. Contestants should cite their major reference materials after the conclusion of their presentation (this will not be counted in the allotted time). Only the judges may ask questions of the contestant in the contest. The time used for questions will not be counted as part of the allotted demonstration time. Contestants should repeat the question and then answer.

Awards and Recognition

Awards will be presented to the top five contestants in each of the three age divisions in Individual Oral Presentations. Awards will be presented to the top five teams in each of the two age divisions in Team Oral Presentations.

DEMONSTRATION SCORECARD

A. INTRODUCTION (10 points)

1. Did the introduction create interest in the subject?
2. Was the introduction short and to the point?
3. Was a catchy title used?

B. ORGANIZATION (25 points)

1. Was only one main idea demonstrated?
2. Did discussion directly relate to the step as it was shown?
3. Was each step shown just as it would be done in an actual situation?
4. Could the audience see each step?
5. Were materials and equipment carefully selected, neatly arranged, and well organized?
6. Were charts/posters used if and when needed?
7. Were key points of each step stressed?

C. CONTENT AND ACCURACY (25 points)

1. Were facts and information accurate?
2. Was there enough information concerning the subject?
3. Were approved practices used?
4. Was credit given to sources of information, if appropriate?
5. Was content appropriately related to the horse industry?

D. STAGE PRESENCE (10 points)

1. Was the demonstrator neat and appropriately dressed for the subject of the demonstration?
2. Did the demonstrator speak directly to the audience?
3. Did the demonstrator look at the audience?
4. Was the demonstration too fast or too slow?
5. Was good teamwork displayed (team demonstrations only)?

E. DELIVERY (15 points)

1. Did the demonstrator appear to enjoy giving the demonstration?
2. Did the demonstrator have good voice control?
3. Were all words pronounced correctly?
4. Were notes used without detracting from the demonstration?
5. Did the demonstrator seem to choose words at the time they were spoken (natural vs. memorized)?

F. EFFECT ON AUDIENCE (5 points)

1. Did the audience show an interest in the demonstration?
2. Could audience go home and carry out the idea?

G. SUMMARY (10 points)

1. Was the summary short and interesting?
2. Were the key points briefly reviewed?
3. Did the summary properly wrap up the demonstration?

Idaho Youth Horse Contests

Horse Public Speaking

Eligibility

Contestants must be members of 4-H or an organized horse interest group approved by the District Extension Representative. Contestants must be at least 8 and not older than 18 (or still in high school) on January 1, 2011. Presenters will be divided into two age groups:

Group 1—Individual Junior 8 - 13 years of age

Group 2—Individual Senior 14 - 18 years of age

Each District Extension Representative may enter 10 public speaking contestants in the state competition. Contestants may be selected by any method determined by the District.

Equipment

The contest committee will provide a podium. A public address system will not be used. Visual aids are not permitted.

Contest Procedure

This is strictly a public speaking contest. Contestant order will be determined by random drawing. The length of the presentations shall be 5 to 8 minutes for 8 to 13 year olds, and 7 to 10 minutes for 14 to 18 year olds. Each judge will deduct 1 point for each minute, or fraction of minute, under or over the prescribed times. The use of notes is permitted. However, judges at their discretion may deduct points for excessive use of notes.

During the event, contestants may introduce themselves by name, county, and speech topic. Only the judges may ask questions of the contestant during the contest. Contestants should cite their major reference materials after the conclusion of their speech. The time used for citing references and questions will not be counted as part of the allotted time. Contestants should repeat the question and then answer.

Awards and Recognition

Awards will be presented to the top five contestants in each of the two age divisions.

Public Speaking Score Card

A. INTRODUCTION (10 points)

1. Did the introduction create interest in the subject?
2. Was the introduction short and to the point?

B. ORGANIZATION (15 points)

1. Were the main points easy to follow?
2. Were the main points arranged in best order?
3. Were sentences short, easy to understand?
4. Was the speech interesting?

C. CONTENT AND ACCURACY (20 points)

1. Were facts and information accurate?
2. Was there enough information concerning the subject?
3. Was credit given to sources of information, if appropriate?
4. Was the content appropriately related to the horse industry?

D. STAGE PRESENCE (15 points)

1. Was the speaker neat and appropriately dressed?
2. Was the speaker friendly?
3. Did the speaker talk directly to the audience?
4. Did the speaker look at the audience?
5. Was the speaker's posture erect, but not stiff?
6. Did the speaker refrain from leaning on podium?
7. Did the speaker seem relaxed and at ease?

E. DELIVERY (20 points)

1. Did the speaker have appropriate voice control?
2. Were all words pronounced correctly?
3. Did the speaker's facial expressions reflect the mood of the speech?
4. Were notes used without detracting from the speech?
5. Did the speaker seem to choose words at the time they were spoken (natural vs. memorized)?

F. GENERAL (10 points)

1. Did the speaker convey to the audience a sense of wanting to communicate?
2. Did the speech reflect the thoughts and personality of the speaker?

G. CONCLUSION (10 points)

1. Was the conclusion short and interesting?
2. Did the conclusion properly wrap up the speech?
3. Could the speaker handle questions easily?


