Reclassification Reviews Narrow During Classification Study

The University of Idaho has launched a review of the classification and compensation practices with respect to all non-faculty exempt and classified staff positions. The Classification and Compensation Task Force with assistance from Sibson Consulting will spend the next nine to ten months developing an updated and effective classification structure and compensation policy.

This activity is not a salary study. It is an in-depth review and process development action that will provide for fair classification of jobs throughout the non-faculty exempt and classified staff system. The work of the task force will be an open process and will result in a structured plan for position classifications. During the coming months as the Task Force does its work, the current hold on reclassifications, promotions and equity adjustment requests will continue in a modified way.

The University recognizes that there may be a need, in unique circumstances, for exceptions. Exceptions will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. We appreciate your

patience and understanding as the Task Force works toward creating a plan for fair classification of all positions. This plan will lead to fair and equitable compensation. Thanks to the members of the Task Force and the staff in the Human Resource Office for their dedication to this important process.
