REC 221, Winter Skills - This course has been absorbed into REC (2XX) Avalanche Fundamentals. Course content and necessary skills are partnered with Avalanche Safety for situational application necessary for careers in winter-based recreation (industry standard). Winter skills are an inherent in backcountry winter travel. The current industry standards would suggest recreation leaders should have avalanche fundamental knowledge to maximize safety and travel.
