

Sourcing Images Online

Just because something is online doesn't mean we can download and use it any way that we want. Material online is to view, read, and enjoy—NOT for us to simply take and reuse. Even at an educational institution, not everything we do qualifies as "fair use" of copyrighted material.

For any online image or material, we must find and read the fine print that says if and how we can use that image or material, and what requirements there are for using it, including how to cite the source or photographer.
