Dog Specie Meeting
September 23, 2019

A. Agility portion of show

1. Possibly run agility first so the dogs are less tired and they can run off a little energy before the rest of the show.
 - a. Concerns: Set up for agility portion takes a while. Each dogs measurements will be verified by a leader and included in the record book. This way, we can have the participant order determined by dog size prior to the actual show because some of the obstacles must be raised or lowered depending on the height of the dog.
2. Scoring
 - a. Loss of time for "attempted": 10 second penalty for an attempt
Attempt: means tried but not perfectly completed. For example, if the dog attempted the weave poles but skipped a pole or entered from the wrong side of the poles but elected to keep going on to the next obstacle rather than come back and try to do it correctly from the start of the obstacle, they will be assessed a 10 second penalty. Other examples could include leaving the pause table too early or knocking down a pole when going over the ramp.
 - b. Loss of time for a skip: 30 second penalty if the object is skipped
Skip: means the object was not tried at all or was not completed. For example, if a dog falls off the walking bridge early on and the handler just continues to the next obstacle without putting the dog back up on the bridge and completing the obstacle that constitutes a skip. Another example could be if the dog goes in the tunnel but comes back out the entrance and the handler takes the dog to the next obstacle, that constitutes a skip. A skip is a bigger infraction than an attempt and will be left to the judges discretion.
3. Agility will be run on a short lead no longer than 12 inches in length. This will help ensure the safety of the dogs because a long leash can get tangled in the obstacle which could cause the dog to choke or stumble. A short lead will give the handler a means to keep the dog on the course. In an effort to make our program better and align it with actual agility standards, participants are encouraged to practice and train the dogs off lead so they can run the course without the lead. Using a lead or not in the competition will be left to the discretion of the handler and leaders.

B. Possibility of a clinic in the late spring or early summer.

1. I would like to hold a clinic and have a station on discipline (obedience, agility, and showmanship) of the show. This will serve to give participants a good idea of what is expected in the show. I think we can man each station just with volunteer leaders but if any participants feel strongly that it should be taught by paid professionals, please let me know. The exact date, location, and details of the clinic are still being determined.

C. Dress Code

1. There have been some complaints about the lack of continuity in the dress code. The dog show follows the rules for dress code posted in the fair information book, namely nice looking long pants and a collared button up shirt devoid of logos. If a particular club would like to set a certain dress code (i.e. white shirts and black pants) they may do so as long as it conforms to the rules in the fair information booklet. For any questions, please refer to the fair information book available in the 4-H office or from your 4-H leader.

D. The dogs will be using Zing Books for their project this year.

1. The superintendent and 4-H office will make sure the content for the dog book is pertinent to the project.










E. Dog Fighting

1. In an attempt to minimize dog fighting we will assign each participant a marked waiting bay. While the dogs are not in show ring, the dog and handler will be required to be in their assigned bay. Participants are encouraged but not required to bring a kennel to put their dog in while they are waiting as this will help further ensure that your dog does not get into an altercation.
2. We cannot afford the liability of a dog fight. As such, there will be a zero tolerance fighting policy. If two dogs get into a fight for any reason, both dogs will be eliminated from the competition. I will not try to determine which dog is at fault. It is the handlers responsibility to keep his dog away from the other dogs and under control at all times and thus out of any fights.

F. Cloverbuds must be enrolled in a dog group and attend dog meetings. In the past, we have had cloverbuds show up having never attended a meeting or worked with their dog. Abiding by this rule will ensure we are teaching participants dog handling skills, not just letting them participate in a show. In addition, according to policy and procedure, cloverbud members may be involved in lap animal projects. This is defined as small dogs that weigh less than the member.

- ~Must have five members from no fewer than three families
- ~Must be organized with youth officers
- ~Must meet six or more times per year
- ~Must be supervised by one or more certified 4-H volunteers
- ~Must participate in at least 1 club service learning project
- ~Must complete a club financial form and turn in by Oct. 1, 2020
