Required Rehearsals

- Monday-Friday, 12:30-1:20 pm, Kibbie Dome (unless otherwise instructed)
- Additional rehearsals may be scheduled as necessary.

Game Day Call Time

Call times will vary depending on the game. Call time is normally <u>four hours</u> prior to kickoff for home games. Members must be in full uniform and ready to play at call time.

Registration

All band members should register in one of the following courses:

First year members: MusA 119, CRN 12906, Marching Band, Sec. 01
 Returning members: MusA 319, CRN 12978, Marching Band, Sec. 01
 Graduate students: MusA 519, CRN 13057, Marching Band, Sec. 01

Credits

Due to the number of contact hours (5+ per week), marching band is available for up to 3 credits; however, students may take the course for fewer credits (1 or 2). This does <u>not</u> decrease the expectations of participants. The UI registration system default is 1 credit. It is the student's responsibility to change his/her registration to the appropriate credit amount (2 or 3 credits) if desired.

Although the course requires the same in-class time commitment for either lower or upper division credit, those registered for upper division credit must meet higher standards of practice and performance. They are expected to demonstrate leadership, both by example and by using previous experience to assist new members.

Instruments

There is no charge for the rental of an instrument used in marching band. However, there will be a late fee for any instrument returned after December 12. You are responsible for maintaining the instrument and will be charged for any damage or missing parts.

Lockers

Contact: Grad TA Jon Stein, Room 124, office hours TBA, <u>icstein@uidaho.edu</u>. Lockers in the Music Building are available on a limited basis. If you are not participating in <u>another</u> instrumental ensemble during fall semester, you do <u>not</u> need a locker because the marching band rehearses in the Kibbie Dome.

Instrument Appearance and Colors

Specially colored instruments and mouthpieces are not allowed. We work very hard to look "uniform" and these items can be very distracting. Brass instruments must use metal mouthpieces. Woodwind neck straps must be black. See Spencer Martin if you have questions about your instrument.

Pencil

<u>Every</u> band member must have a pencil at <u>every</u> marching band rehearsal. You will need to mark your music with notes about the music as well as drill instructions. No exceptions!

Music for Shows

Everyone will receive one copy of each show. Every student (even if sharing a stand) must have their own copy while on the field when drill is rehearsed. If we are working on the show, each individual should have their <u>part</u> and a <u>pencil</u>.

Music Book

Everyone will receive one music book. Every student must have their own book at all rehearsals and games. Replacement books are available for \$20.00. All music performed on the field (pregame, halftime, etc.) must be memorized.

How do we contact you?

It is important that the band has current phone numbers for all members. Most announcements will be made through email. All email correspondence will be sent to your "vandals.uidaho.edu" address.

Band Shirts

Everyone must have at least one "IDAHO" Marching Band black band tee shirt. Replacement shirts are available for \$10. This will serve as our informal "uniform" for some events.

Earlier versions of the band shirt may be worn under the uniform but may <u>not</u> be worn for events where a band shirt is used as our "informal" uniform.

Uniform Shoes

All wind and percussion members must provide their own Super Drillmasters <u>black shoes</u>. Band members are responsible for ordering their own shoes. The cost is around \$35.00. These are available through BandShoppe:

Uniform Checkout

Location: Blake House "Ground Floor" (enter from Blake Avenue)

You need the following measurements for fitting:

- Chest measurement (same as men's coat size)
- Waist measurement
- Pant inseam measurement

You have two opportunities to checkout a uniform during band camp: <u>Thursday 7-9 pm</u> and <u>Saturday 7-9 pm</u>. Color guard members will receive their uniform at an arranged time.

Uniforms Rules

- Everyone must take great care to maintain his or her uniform. Members are responsible for all parts of their uniform. Full replacement is approximately \$500.
- Uniforms are to be worn in proper fashion at all times. Jackets must be zipped and buttoned when in public view. It is either FULL UNIFORM or NO UNIFORM. Take pride in how you look! You represent yourself and the band, LHSOM, and UI.
- Uniforms should be hung on hangers while not in use. Do not throw your uniform in the bag and leave it until the next performance.
- You are responsible for keeping your uniform clean during the season. Uniforms must be dry-cleaned only. Do not attempt to wash your uniform in a traditional washing machine. If your uniform must be dry-cleaned during the season, only use Western Laundry Unlimited at 616 S. Main Street in Moscow.
- Pant lengths must be adjusted so that the parts are not too long or too short. The pant cuff should touch the top of the marching shoe without breaking the crease line. If too long, pants must be hemmed. If too short, new pants should be acquired from the Crew.
- <u>Black</u> socks must be worn with the band uniform. They must be <u>long</u> socks (not anklet style) and must be completely black,
- Long hair is defined as hair that touches the collar. Long hair must be secured inside the hat and must not hang outside the band hat.
- A bandana may be worn in the stands if it is black, silver, gold, or white. Only black bandanas may be worn under the band hat.
- Our marching band hat is the only hat allowed while in uniform (formal or informal) and in the stands.
- Neck straps must be black. Blue or orange neck straps are particularly problematic.
- Sunglasses will be provided and are a part of the marching band uniform. You are responsible for your sunglasses at all times during the season. Broken or damaged sunglasses must be replaced.
- Plumes will be distributed at each performance. Be careful with your crow!
- Raincoats will be distributed as needed for outdoor events.
- Smoking is not allowed at any time while in uniform. No exceptions.
- Students who return their uniforms late after the season (time TBA) will be charged a \$50 late cleaning fee.

In the Stands

- All members are expected to play throughout the entire game as directed
- Only play when directed. No "noodling" on your instrument. (Practice at home!)
- Be ready to play at all times. Some game breaks come with no warning. We will be especially busy while our team is on defense.
- Every member must bring their book to each game. Replacements for lost books are \$20.00.
- Share a stand with someone in your section. One book is for the next "long" song while the other is for the next "Short."

- You may only leave the band section to use the restroom or get nourishment. Do not linger while away. Take care of business and get back to your section.
- Never respond to negative comments by the crowd.
- Show great Vandal spirit by participating in all cheers and chants.
- Seating is tight so visitors must find seating in other sections.
- No homework, cell phone calls, texting, etc. is allowed in the stands during the game. We are there to play (our instruments).

Band Photographs

Many pictures will be available on the band's webpage. A photographer will take also take a full group picture, section pictures, and individual photos. Member will be able to purchase individual photos and packages.

Ear Protection

Marching band can be a loud experience. It is the student's responsibility to protect their hearing! Earplugs are always available but please re-use as much as possible.

Texting and Cell Phones

Cell phones should be turned off or put on "silent" during rehearsals. Any phones used for text messaging or phone calls during class will be confiscated and <u>not</u> returned. Disciplinary action may also follow.

Scholarship

We are again fortunate to offer all members a scholarship to be paid at the end of the fall semester. First year members will receive \$300. Returning members will receive \$400. To receive the full scholarship amount you must:

- Complete the course with a grade of C or better. Failure to do so will result in the loss of the entire scholarship award.
- Have a signed contract on file with the band director.

Scholarships will be reduced appropriately for class conflicts or performance absences.

Post Season Games

In the event that UI goes to a post season game, the band may attend pending funding. Information will be provided to band members as it is available.

Course Grade

Grades will be determined by attendance (70%) and performance tests (30%). Attitude or preparation problems may also be considered in grading.

Attendance Records

Behavior

Professional behavior is expected at all times. Punctuality, proper decorum, appropriate language, and appropriate social behavior indicate this professionalism. The use and/or

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influence of alcohol at any official marching band function, event, or performance is not allowed and will not be tolerated.

Dismissal

The marching band director reserves the right to dismiss any member at any time who is not contributing to the group in a positive manner. This will result in loss of the entire band scholarship and course credit.

Attendance Policy

Rehearsal Absences

<u>Three</u> rehearsal absences are allowed without affecting a student's grade. Notes explaining these absences are <u>not</u> required. Each absence beyond three will lower the final grade by one letter <u>per occurrence</u>. Exceptions will be made in extreme cases only when submitted in writing. Excessive tardiness will not be tolerated.

Part 3, Regulation M-2 of the UI Catalog states:

M-2. Repeated Absences. In courses where a substantial amount of the content can be mastered only or primarily through class participation, regular and punctual attendance is essential and may, therefore, be reflected in grading. Instructors will make clear at the beginning of each course the extent to which grades are dependent on attendance. Instructors may report to the registrar students who are repeatedly absent from classes (a form is available from departmental and college officials). **Absences may be considered excessive when their number equals or exceeds the number of credits in a particular course.**

Tardiness

Rehearsal begins at 12:30 pm every day. If a student is late, their attendance will be recorded as "late." Three "late" arrivals will be counted as one absence.

Performance Absences

Performance absences are not allowed except in extreme circumstances. Students must submit a <u>written request</u> (email is acceptable) to miss a performance at least <u>three weeks before the performance</u>. The director will determine whether a performance absence is excused or unexcused. In either case (excused or unexcused), it is the student's responsibility to find a suitable replacement to march in missed performances. Unexcused absences will result in a maximum grade of "C" for the course and a complete loss of marching band scholarship. Excused absences will not affect either grade or scholarship.

Attendance Records

Students should check their attendance record often. It is the student's responsibility to bring up any discrepancies with the Director in a timely fashion.

Class Conflicts

A class conflict will ONLY be approved if it meets all three of the following criteria:

- the conflicting course is specifically required for your degree
- the course is not offered at any other time during Fall semester
- the course is not offered in the Spring semester

All class conflicts must be submitted in writing for approval using the Class Conflict Form. If approved, students with class conflicts that require them to miss two or more classes per week may only register for one or two credits.
