THE OPPORTUNITY: We're recruiting dedicated, responsible and enthusiastic undergraduates who would like to participate in undergraduate research on malaria.

WHAT IS MALARIA? Malaria is a disease caused by infection with parasites transmitted by mosquitoes. Currently, more than 60% of the world is at risk for malaria and there are more than 200 million cases and more than 400,000 deaths each year due to malaria.

WHAT WOULD THIS RESEARCH INVOLVE? The Luckhart lab works on mosquito physiology, malaria transmission, and disease biology using both animal and human malaria parasites. Our undergraduate researchers typically assist with ongoing projects involving behavioral assays, molecular biology, cell biology, biochemistry in our model organisms. With evidence of good skill, our undergraduates often complete independent projects and are included as co-authors on peer-reviewed publications.
