



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



nternationally acclaimed genius of the jazz world and undisputed drummer Jimmy Bertrand, and drums became Lionel's first instrument. During a session break, Armstrong pointed to a set of vibes at the back of the studio and asked Hamp if he knew how to play them. Taking up the challenge, Lionel, who was well-schooled in his keyboard studies, picked up the mallets and said he'd give it a go. The first tune they cut was "Memories of You," which had recently been written by Eubie Blake. It became a tremendous hit for Louis and young Lionel and has remained a classic throughout the years. Jazz impresario John Hammond heard the record even before it was released and raved to Benny Goodman about Lionel's performance on the vibraphone. But it wasn't until 1936, when Hammond flew out to the Paradise Club in Los Angeles with Benny Goodman in tow, that the famed band leader heard Lionel in person. Mightily impressed, Goodman signed Lionel on the spot. Benny had a trio within his big band which featured Goodman, Teddy Wilson on piano, and Gene Krupa on drums. The trio quickly became a quartet. "Next thing you know," recalls Hamp, "I was on stage jamming with these great musicians. That's one session I'll never forget."

The Benny Goodman Quartet made immediate musical history, not only for the brilliant music they produced, but because they were the first racially integrated group of jazz musicians ever. significance. Among the classics the Quartet recorded. as it fast became the premier jazz group in the world, were "Moonglow," Dinah," and "Vibraphone Blues."

Hampton formed his own big band in the early 1940's. Following the release of a succession of highly successful records under his own name, "Sunny Side of the Street" (on which he sang as well as played vibes) and "Central Avenue Breakdown" (on which he played piano with two fingers, using them as if they were vibes mallets) among them, he flew to the top of the charts with his recordings of "Flying Home" in 1942 and "Hamp's Boogie-Woogie" in 1943.

The Lionel Hampton Orchestra had a phenomenal array of sidemen, far too long to list here, who got their start with Hamp. However, among these were Quincy Jones, Wes Montgomery, Clark Terry, Cat Anderson, Ernie Royal, Joe Newman, and Fats Navarro. Also among his protégés were singers Dinah Washington (who was discovered and named by Hamp,) Joe Williams, Betty Carter, and the now legendary Aretha Franklin. Jazz giant Hampton has received innumerable prestigious awards over the years. Among those of which he is most proud are the title Official American Goodwill Ambassador, bestowed by Presidents Eisenhower and Nixon, the Papal Medal from Pope Paul I, seventeen Honorary Doctorates and the Gold Medal of Paris, France's highest cultural award. In 1992 the highly-coveted Kennedy Center Honors Award, shared with Mstislav Rostropovich, Paul Taylor, Joanne

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Woodward, Paul Newman, and Ginger Rogers. With many honors and awards following through the years, Lionel was truly overwhelmed to receive The National Medal of the Arts at the White House in January 1997 bestowed by President William Jefferson Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham-Clinton.

Reminiscing recently about his lifetime of honors and recognitions, Hampton held that the highlight of his career took place when the Music School at the University of Idaho was named the *Lionel Hampton School of Music* in 1987. It was the first university school of music ever named in honor of a jazz musician. This festival, again, is the first jazz festival in the world named after a jazz musician, and Lionel will tell you it's one of his greatest joys. The last week in February is Lionel Hampton's favorite time of year.

Mr. Hampton is also an accomplished composer. His original ballad "Midnight Sun" (written with Johnny Mercer and Sonny Burke) a beloved classic in American jazz and popular music, is among the many well-known jazz and pop compositions written over the years by the gifted musician. Hampton's own longtime record label, Glad Hamp Records, has released many dozens of recordings. In September, an All-Star Tribute was given to Hampton at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Jazz luminaries Joe Williams, Dr. Billy Taylor, Terence Blanchard, Ernestine Anderson, Milt Hinton, Buddy DeFranco, and vibists Milt Jackson, Roy Ayers and Terry Gibbs, all performed in Lionel's honor. Toward the end of the concert, Hamp insisted on joining the vibists and strode on stage and played. The audience gave him a standing ovation. In October, Lionel Hampton and his Golden Men of Jazz appeared for a week at the famed Blue Note in New York City. Hamp's drawing power has never been greater. To packed houses, Lionel played two strenuous sets

a night and brought the house down with each performance. January 1996 brought a two week engagement at the elegant Tavern On The Green in New York City. The entire engagement, of two shows a night, was completely sold-out before the opening. Each show brought standing ovations. February had Hamp at the helm of his four-day annual jazz festival at the University of Idaho. Peter Jenning's highly

respected "World News Tonight" on the ABC network covered the entire four-days, On his television show, Peter Jennings saluted Lionel and bestowed his highlycoveted "Person of the Week" honor on Lionel. April had Lionel in a tribute appearance at the famed Apollo Theatre in New York entitled, "Lionel Hampton's Swing Into Spring." A host of jazz legends saluted the great jazz master at this landmark theatre. Also, this special year brought Lionel to Los Angeles' South Central section where five of that troubled part of the city's high schools gave a unified concert in Lionel's honor. Hamp donated his time and considerable energies to working with the youngsters and providing them with encouraging words and music to continue their promising young careers. In Tampa, Florida in June, Hamp was inducted into the International Jazz Hall of Fame, then rushed back to New York for another popular week at New York's Blue Note. In November, Europe beckoned once again and Lionel put together his big New York band and traveled to his opening concert at the Teatre Sistina in Rome, followed by concerts in Munich, Linz and Vienna, Austria. The tour was a spellbinder and Lionel is invited back again same time next year.

Following the jaunt around Europe's splendid cities, Lionel rushed home to be honored by Jazz at Lincoln Center and was presented with the organization's first Jazz Master's Award at a gala concert in Avery Fisher Hall. Wynton Marsalis' Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra played many of Lionel's well known compositions. Natalie Cole gave a stirring rendition of Lionel's ballad

First associated with the young lion new breed, Greg is now going back into the roots of jazz and creating explosions in a much more traditional vein. Greg sharpened his musical skills in the bands of Betty Carter and Joe Henderson (both of whom have done things original and new with the tradition) and alongside new stalwarts of rhythm Christian McBride, Geri Allen and Marc Cary, so he's made it clear that he knows the prevailing jazz currents. What is also clear is that Greg thinks about where his music has been, and he is now able to live those questions with Ray Brown, who has never stopped questioning. Ray Brown began his formal music training on piano when he was 8. He later learned to play bass by ear, and from then on a whole new world opened up for him. After high school, Brown went on the road with the Jimmy Hinsley Sextet and later the Snookum Russell band. Then Brown ventured off on his own to New York City

where he was introduced to Dizzy Gillespie. His reputation had preceded him, and he was invited to join in the next day's rehearsal. He was hired and remained with the Dizzy Gillespie band for the next two years, playing with jazz greats Charlie Parker, Max Roach, and Bud Powell. He then formed his own trio with Hank Jones on piano and Charles Smith on drums. He met many musicians during these years; among them was the great jazz vocalist, Ella Fitzgerald whom he married. Brown became a regular member of the Jazz at the Philharmonic Group and was introduced to Oscar Peterson, resulting in a 15-year liaison of brilliant music, warm friendship and respect. Brown has made hundreds of recordings, scored motion pictures, and performed on major television shows. The current Ray Brown Trio consists of drummer Greg Hutchinson and pianist Geoff Keezer.

Born in Nanaimo, British Columbia, Diana grew up surrounded by music and musicians - her mother and father both played the piano. She studied classical piano but played jazz in the school band with bassistteacher Bryan Stovell. Diana's first gig was at age fifteen in a Nanaimo restaurant and she's been playing ever since. Her favorite singers have all played piano: Dinah Washington, Roberta Flack, Shirley Horn, Andy Bey, Aretha Franklin, Sarah Vaughan and especially Carmen McRae and Nat Cole. Her first inspiration was Fats Waller. When she was just a kid, she tried to learn all his tunes and to play and sing at the same time. Diana studied for a while on a Vancouver Jazz Festival scholarship at Berklee College of Music in Boston. She returned to British Columbia where she became friends with Jeff Hamilton and Ray Brown when they performed there. They encouraged her to venture down to Los Angeles, where a Canadian Arts Council grant enabled her to study with pianist Jimmy Rowles, who, being a pianist-singer himself, inspired her to sing more. Hamilton's musical partner, bassist John Clayton, also befriended Diana, and they often performed together as a trio. In 1984, Diana returned to Canada from Los Angeles and settled in Toronto, where she studied with bassist-pianist Don Thompson. She came to New York in 1990, but she performed most often in Boston with a trio that included bassist Whit Browne and drummer Klaus Suonsaari. Diana's recent release, Love Scenes, has been nominated for a Grammy as "Best Jazz Vocal Performance."

Bassist-composer Ben Wolfe was born in Baltimore, Maryland, but grew up in Portland, Oregon. By his early twenties he was freelancing regularly in the Portland area and also backing national acts such as Woody Shaw. In January of 1994, he joined the Wynton Marsalis septet and remained with the group until it disbanded. He spent most of 1995 working with Wynton Marsalis and the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra, which included performances with Joe Henderson, Harry "Sweets" Edison, Slide Hampton, Doc Cheatham, Phil Woods, Jimmie Heath, Billy Higgins, Charles McPherson, John Faddis, Al Grey, John Hendricks, and many others.



Born Anna Marie Woolridge in Chicago, her career began as a child of five at home. Her first paid job was in the basement of the A.M.E. Church in Jackson, Michigan when she was 19. Abbey's first mentor, Bob Russell, named her Abbey Lincoln and produced her first recording with Benny Carter and Marty Paitch. He also helped to secure Lincoln a featured performance in the Jayne Mansfield movie, *The Girl Can't Help It*. In 1957, Abbey began a musical collaboration with Max Roach and was eventually featured on his famous recording, *Freedom Now Suite*. In 1965, she made her debut as an actress as the leading lady in the social film, *Nothing But a Man* and three years later she played the title role with Sidney Poitier in *For Love of Ivy*.

Abbey's 45-year vocal career has come into full flower over the last ten years. She has increasingly emerged as an engaging and profound songwriter, as well, addressing matters of the heart and the spirit with emotional commitment and musical grace. "I sometimes see myself as a space traveler who makes reports," says Abbey Lincoln. She is making reference to the the opening image of "The River," the final song on her latest Verve release, *Who Used to Dance*. But she could be alluding to her role as a commentator on the general state of human affairs on earth. Abbey is serious about her responsibility as a chronicler of the human capacity to love and the impulse to endure. "You need music for your spirit, it's not a luxury, it's necessity," she elaborates. "You have to have something to listen to that will lift your spirit.....I don't think we can come to this music to be rich and for everybody to know our names. I think it's a holy experience with your spirit. It will visit you if it finds you worthy, but you can't just reach and grab it. If you are in the right place and your spirit is conducive to this, the muse will come and hang with you. Sometimes it takes you all your life."

At seventeen, Marian McPartland headed for a career in classical music at Guildhall School of Music in London, but she had already fallen in love with jazz and after three years, she left to join a fourpiano group touring in vaudeville theaters countrywide. Later she joined the USO and sitting in on a jam session in Belgium, she performed with the renowned Jimmy McPartland, whom she later married. In 1946 they returned to the United States, where Marian played with her husband's quintet in Chicago before forming the Marian McPartland Trio which opened in New York in 1950 at the Embers Club. Two years later the trio played what was to have been a two-week engagement at the Hickory House, but they were held over for a year. The Hickory House became home base for Marian and her group into the 1960's. Songs composed by Marian have been recorded by Peggy Lee, Cleo Laine, Tony Bennett, Sarah Vaughn and George Shearing. Marian McPartland's virtuoso performance at the piano and her personal style of jazz have won her acclaim, a large enthusiastic following, and an international reputation as one of the most important figures in jazz today. This multi-faceted artist appears on concert stages, in night clubs, at universities, and on radio, television, and records. She has been the recipient of many awards, most notably the prestigious Peabody Award and the ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award for her National Public Radio show, "Piano Jazz," which has also won awards from the Corporation of Public Broadcasting. Marian's most recent release is entitled Marian McPartland with Strings - Silent Pool, and features her own compositions.

A New Orleans native, Blanchard began studying the piano at the age of five. He wasn't excited about his lessons until one day in the third grade when a jazz band came to his school for an assembly. After hearing trumpet player Alvin Alcorn, Terence said, "I want to do that!" From that day to the present, Blanchard has diligently been working on his craft as a jazz musician. Though he has been friends with Wynton Marsalis since they met in the sixth grade, Blanchard should not be mistaken as a protege of Wynton's. Both arrived on the jazz scene at the same time, when the music was in great trouble and both became an integral part of the 1980's jazz resurgence. Blanchard's own career has involved both performing and composing. His many projects include soundtracks for the Spike Lee films, Malcolm X, Get On The Bus, and Four Little Girls, plus others like Trial By Jury, The Promised Land (received Emmy nomination for Best Score) and most recently Sidney Poitier's film for Showtime, Free of Eden. "Few can match Blanchard's precision and flair for evoking emotion," wrote Time magazine. "He has developed an expressive style reminiscent of the mid-1960's Miles Davis." His most recent CD, The Heart Speaks, was nominated for a Grammy. **Terence Blanchard** trumpet

Kenny Barron began piano studies at the age of 12. Only two years later he had his first professional gig with Mel Melvin's orchestra playing alongside his saxophonist brother (and inspiration) Bill. Matter of fact, it was Bill who introduced the budding keyboardist to fellow Philadelphians and future legends Jimmy and Tootie Heath, John Coltrane, and Lee Morgan. "I even got to work with Philly Joe Jones," Kenny recalls. "I was in high school and that was a very big deal to me. In 1962, after a stint with drummer Roy Haynes and a subsequent move to New York, Kenny was hired by Dizzy Gillespie on James Moody's advice. It was then that he started to make a name for himself. While with Diz, Kenny grew enormously as both a player and a composer. After leaving Dizzy's band in 1966, Barron played with numerous musicians including Freddie Hubbard, Jimmy Owens, Stanley Turrentine, Milt Jackson and Stan Getz. Barron played on Getz's album VOYAGE in 1986 and toured Europe the next year along with Getz, Victor Lewis and Rufus Reid. The music played on that tour is featured on the releases "Anniversary" and "Serenity." As a leader, Kenny has released a pair of winners for Verve: 1993's Grammy nominee, "Sambao," and 1994's "Other Places." His most recent release, "Wanton Spirit," is a mixture of impeccable standards and jewel-like originals.

Over the years Ben has played all over the world with a wide variety of musicians including Earl "Fatha" Hines, Clark Terry, Alice Coltrane, Toots Thieilemanns, Milt Hinton, the Ron Carter Group and South African Pianist/Composer Abdullah Lbrahim.

Born in Oakland, CA, Jon Faddis began playing trumpet at age eight, inspired by an appearance of Louis Armstrong on "The Ed Sullivan Show." Three years later, his trumpet teacher Bill Catalano, as alumnaus of the Stan Kenton band, turned the jazz-struck youngster on to Dizzy Gillespie. By his midteens, Jon had not only met Dizzy, he'd even sat in with his hero's combo at the famed Jazz Workshop in San Francisco. Upon graduating high school in 1971, Jon joined Lionel Hampton's band as a featured soloist and moved to New York. During those early years Jon also played or recorded with the Thad Jones/Mel Lewis Big Band, Charles Mingus, Dizzy, Oscar Peterson, Eubie Blake and Sarah Vaughan. At the age of 20, amid the pressure of public life, Jon opted for the sequestered life of a studio musician. His distinctive trumpet voice can be heard on albums by performers a disparate as Duke Ellington, the Rolling Stones, Frank Sinatra, Kool and the Gang, Luther Vandross, Quincy Jones, Billy Joel and Stanley Clarke, to name a few. A visit to the White House with Dizzy Gillespie for an "In Performance" ceremony in 1982 was enough to convince Faddis that he had a lot more to offer than horn section lead on jingles, or the occasional solo (often uncredited) on a lavish studio production of a pop star. Within a year he was back on the club scene. Over the last ten years, besides his own performances, Jon has served as the musical director for Dizzy's United Nations Orchestra, the Carnegie Hall Jazz Band and the 1995 Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra. His discography includes Hornucopia, Into the Faddisphere and Legacy.

Paquito D'Rivera saxophone & clarinet

Born in Havana, Paquito was a child prodigy who began his musical studies at the age of five under the tutelage of his father, Tito, himself a well-known classical saxophonist and conductor in Cuba. At the age of six he was performing in public and when he was seven became the voungest artist ever to endorse a musical instrument when he signed on with Selmer. Paquito entered the Havana Conservatory to study music at the age of twelve and by nineteen was performing as a featured soloist with the Cuban National Symphony Orchestra. Paquito co-founded and conducted the renowned Orchestra Cubana de Musica Moderna for two years, then joined some of the musicians to form the group *Irakere* which created a completely new mixture of jazz, rock, classical and traditional Cuban music. This musical movement resulted in the historic recording. Havana Jam which received a Grammy. Dissatisfied with the constraints placed on his music in Cuba, D'Rivera sought asylum with the American Embassy. Encouraged by Dizzy Gillespie, David Amram, and others, Paquito was introduced to the jazz scene in New York and was given his first recording date. Throughout his career in the U.S. his albums have received rave reviews from critics and have hit the top of the jazz charts. His albums have shown a progression that demonstrates his extraordinary abilities in bebop, classical and Latin/Caribbean music as well as South American music which he is presently exploring.



Roditi began his musical studies when he was just five years old. By the time he was 12, he had already become a serious jazz listener. Eight years later, he was named a finalist in the International Jazz Competition in Vienna. Claudio studied music at the Berklee School of Music in Boston and later joined the faculty of the School of Contemporary Music, all the while continuing to perform at clubs and concerts. In 1976, Claudio moved to New York where he has performed and/or recorded with Charlie Rouse, Herbie Mann, Slide Hampton, and Paquito D'Rivera, among others. Claudio integrates post-bop elements and Brazilian rhythmic concepts with ease and plays with power and lyricism. This versatility keeps him in demand as a leader, a studio musician and a sideman. He is also a composer and arranger and has five critically-acclaimed albums. Currently he leads his own band and frequently travels as a member of Dizzy Gillespie's United Nations Orchestra.

Trombonist Slide Hampton's skills as a soloist, ensemble player, teacher, composer, arranger and conductor have earned him the respect of the jazz community. He first performed in a family band led by his father and in the bands of such artists as Dizzy Gillespie and Maynard Ferguson before forming his own band in 1962. Since then, he has accepted the directorships of the Collective Black Artists Ensemble and the Manhattan Plaza Jazz Composers Orchestra, providing original compositions and arrangements. He considers the organization of "Slide Hampton and His World of Trombones," an ensemble consisting of nine trombones and a rhythm section, as one of the major achievements of his career.

Alex Acuna drums





Peruvian drummer and percussionist Alex Acuna is widely known as a gifted musician, teacher and clinician. He performs almost everywhere in different groups and for him no style is a stranger. He has become highly regarded for his ability as a Latin-Jazz, Jazz-Rock, Fusion drummer and percussionist. He began trumpet and piano with his father in Peru, but from the age of five is self-taught on drums. By the age of 20, he was one of the most accomplished session drummers in Peru. In 1964, Alex was asked by the great latin band leader Perez Prado to join his big band. Over the next ten years, Alex played in bands and worked as a studio musician in Puerto Rico, Las Vegas and Los Angeles. During this time he also studied for three years at the Puerto Rico Conservatory of Music, playing as a classical percussionist under the direction of the famed Spanish cellist master Pablo Casals. Acuna moved to the United States in 1974 and has since played with Elvis Presley, Diana Ross and Weather Report. His countless album credits and live performances include such diverse artists as U2, Paul McCartney, Al Jarreau, the Yellowjackets, Ella Fitzgerald and Michael Jackson. In 1980, Alex formed his own group, Koinonia, with some professional Christian artists from the Los Angeles area. More recently, Alex has become known for his clinics and instructional videos. His clinics are unusually varied. One of his favorite demonstrations is a "cymbal solo." Citing many references from I Chronicles 13-15 where "the musicians....were to sound the bronze cymbals," Alex performs an extended improvisation on the cymbals alone. His appearance at the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival is sponsored by Latin Percussion (LP), Yamaha, Zildjian and Vic Firth, Inc.



Venezuelan -born pianist Edward Simon came to the United States on a scholarship for classical training. He studied with concert pianist Susan Starr at the University of Arts in Philadelphia and later, studied jazz piano with Harold Danko at the Manhatten School of Music. By the time he was 18, Edward was recording and touring with guitarist Kevin Eubanks and with saxophonist Greg Osby. He has been steadily employed by jazz innovators Herbie Mann, Paquito D'Rivera, Bobby Hutcherson and Jerry Gonzales. At 19, Simon joined Bobby Watson's group Horizon. He toured and recorded with the group for four years. Presently, Edward is a member of the Terence Blanchard Quartet. Through his varied experiences, Simon has matured into a new brand of player. To quote Herbie Mann, "If you can imagine somebody who grew up in the salsa mentality who has the sensitivity of pianists Keith Jarrett and Bill Evans , the result is Edward."

Within the music world, Pete Candoli is regarded as one of the most precise and eloquent interpreters of jazz. A trumpet player of major importance, Pete has played with over 27 of the top name bands, including Tommy Dorsey, Glenn Miller, Woody Herman, Charlie Barnet, Stan Kenton, Les Brown, and Count Basie. He has composed and arranged

music for Judy Garland, Ella Fitzgerald, and Peggy Lee, and made recordings with over fifty top recording artists, including Henry Mancini, Igor Stravinsky, Nelson Riddle, and Quincy Jones. Pete was named outstanding trumpet player by both Down Beat and Metronome Magazine, the two most prestigious publications in the music business. When Pete is not playing a jazz festival, concert or nightclub, he is active conducting college music seminars.





Now recognized as an international jazz giant of the trumpet, Conte began blowing his horn at the age of sixteen, working his way around the major big bands of the time, Woody Herman, Stan Kenton, Charlie Barnet, Benny Goodman, and Jimmy Dorsey. He has played with many of the smaller best known jazz ensembles such as Super Sax, Charlie Ventura, Shelly Manne, Howard Rumsey's Lighthouse All Stars, and many others. Renowned as one of the world's top studio

musicians, Conte Candoli probably works on more recording sessions than any other living trumpet player. He has recorded with Frank Sinatra, Bing Crosby, John Lennon, Chicago and other contemporary artists as well as on his own. He was highly visible as part of the brass section of the NBC Tonight Show Band for many years.


Wallace was four when he began toying with the trumpet and five when he began theory and piano lessons. By nine, Wallace was studying advanced trumpet with Sigmund Haring of the Philadelphia Orchestra, his hometown band. By thirteen Wallace had his own band and a year later he recorded with poet/activist Haki Madhubuti. In 1979, he won Down Beat Magazine's "Best Young Jazz Musician of the Year" award announcing him to be one of the most important "future people" in jazz. After attending Howard University and the Berklee College of Music, he joined Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers and later was offered the Music Director's chair by Blakey. At the same time, drummer Tony Williams requested Wallace's horn in the front line. He toured with both bands and his reputation grew, winning Down Beat's Critics Poll as Talent Deserving Wider Recognition in 1990. (No less than Dizzy Gillespie listed him as a personal favorite.) In 1991, Miles Davis invited Wallace to perform with him in the Montreux Jazz Festival and in 1992 a special band in tribute to Miles Davis was formed. Featuring Wayne Shorter, Herbie Hancock, Ron Carter, Tony Williams and Wallace Roney as starring trumpeter, the band began a world tour in 1992. When asked about his musical direction, Wallace replied that he strives to "push music as far as it can go. We're dealing with polychords and polyharmonies. The way you can superimpose chords over chords has become very intriguing to me."

Double bassist John Clayton has gained prominence as performer, composer, and arranger in both the jazz and classical fields. John's brilliance and versatility is evident in his work, whether he is acting as jazzman, band leader, composer, arranger, teacher or music director. After studying bass under the esteemed Ray Brown, John was bassist for the television series The Mancini Generation, following which he toured and recorded internationally with jazz pianist Monty Alexander and then began a two year association with Count Basie and his orchestra. After five years as principal bass with the Amsterdam Philharmonic Orchestra in Holland, John moved to Los Angeles where he conducts, composes, and coleads the Clayton-Hamilton Jazz Orchestra. In 1991 John received a Grammy nomination for his composition "Brush This" from the Orchestra's album "Grove Shop." Their 1991 release, "Heart and Soul," received critical acclaim and included four of John's original compositions. In addition to conducting and arranging for such notable performers as Natalie Cole, Whitney Houston, Diana Ross, Nancy Wilson, Joe Williams, and the Tonight Show Band, John has been music director for several jazz festivals and teaches at the University of Southern California. The great jazz critic Leonard Feather named John "one of six artists most capable of assuming Miles Davis' role in challenging the boundaries of jazz and inspiring change."

The new 'bass sensation' Christian McBride was born into a musical family in Philadelphia. Both his father and grandfather are professional bass players. In 1989 McBride moved to New York where he was soon discovered by alto saxophonist Bobby Watson. Since then he has worked with Terence Blanchard, Branford and Wynton Marsalis, Roy Hargrove, Ray Brown and Freddie Hubbard. As his major music influences he cites James Brown and bassists Ray Brown, Paul Chambers and Ron Carter. McBride's latest album, Remembering Bud Powell, has been nominated for a Grammy as the "Best Jazz Instrumental Performance."

Ethel Ennis is truly a legendary singer. She started playing piano and singing with combos and orchestras while a high school student and by seventeen, she had written her first commercial song which was recorded nationally by at least five different artists, including Little Richard. Widespread public recognition came with her first national recording at age 22. That vintage 1955 recording entitled "Lullabies for Losers" has been reissued under various labels ever since. She was selected by Benny Goodman as female vocalist for an all-star band which toured Western Europe. She has shared the stage with such luminaries as Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Miles Davis ... and the list goes on. Known for her versatility, this remarkable musician, singer, and composer defies easy categories. She has sung professionally for more than thirty years, singing everything from Beethoven and Ellington to blues, bossa nova, popular hits, and the avant garde. Ethel Ennis makes her fourth appearance this year at the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival.


Frank was born in Cincinnati, Ohio and was writing and arranging music for his own 12-piece band by the time he entered high school. In 1953, after college and a stint with the 7th Army Infantry Division Band, Frank joined the Count Basie Band. He was a key contributor as tenor saxophonist, composer and arranger. He wrote such classic tunes as "Shiny Stockings", "Blues in Frankie's Flat" and "Four-Five-Six." Since leaving the band in 1964, Foster has played and recorded extensively with his own groups and the groups of others. He has also been in demand as an arranger for other recording artists including Frank Sinatra, George Benson, Lena Horne and Diane Schuur. His arrangements have received numerous Grammy nominations and awards, including Best Arrangement Accompanying a Vocal, Jazz Catagory for his arrangement of "Deedles Blues" on the Diane Schuur/ Count Basie Orchestra and Best Instrumental Arrangement, Jazz catagory for "Basie's Bag" on the Basie Band album, Big Boss Band. In 1980 he was commissioned to write a suite dedicated to the Winter Olympics in Lake Placid. The resultant "Lake Placid Suite" was performed at the Olympics by a 20-piece orchestra under his direction. Frank took over leadership of the Count Basie Orchestra in 1986 and only recently resigned. Leo Rising, Foster's first small group recording in 25 years, was released in February 1997 on Arabesque Records.

Frank Wess was born in 1922 in Kansas City, Missouri, but grew up in Oklahoma and Washington, D.C. He played with Bill Baldwin and Blanche Calloway before joining the army in 1941. After getting out of the service in 1944, he played in the Billy Eckstine Orchestra and with Eddie Heyward, Lucky Millinder and Bull Moose Jackson before heading back to Washington D.C. to study the flute. Wess joined the Count Basie Band in 1953 and rapidly made a name for himself as an exceptional tenor man and as the first jazz star to record extensively and with complete success as a flute soloist. He won the Downbeat critics' poll New Star Award in 1954. Frank has also had success as an arranger and composer. His arrangements for Basie include "Basie Goes Wess" and "Yesterdays."

Al Grey trombone

World class trombonist, composer, arranger and educator, Al "Golden Trombone" Grey, is a consummate musician and an original stylist. A veteran big band player, Al Grey is recognized internationally as a premier trombonist, and the foremost proponent of the plunger and mute. In his early days, Grey performed with the leading big bands, which included those of Benny Carter, Luck Millinder, Jimmy Lunceford, Dizzy Gillespie and Lionel Hampton. Grey embarked upon a amazing career throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, the Middle East, the Far East and even behind the Iron Curtain. Between various band performances, he produced more than 1,000 recordings with famous greats such as Frank Sinatra, Bing Crosby, Count Basie, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Sarah Vaughn and Teresa Brewer. For nearly 20 years, Grey toured with Count Basie and was a featured soloist, expounding the tantalizing vocal sounds of the mute and plunger. His triple-tongued lectures, bellowing growls, lowdown bubbly notes and condensed phrases imitate the gamut of human conversation. No wonder Basie called him "Mr. Fabulous".

> A jazz trombonist who is among the best on his instrument, Bill Watrous has played with Quincy Jones, Woody Herman, Count Basie and was a member of the group "Ten Wheel Drive". He has recorded with many top name artists, including Frank Sinatra, Quincy Jones, Ella Fitzgerald, Peggy Lee, and Ray Charles, to name only a few. Bill was a staff musician for CBS and a member of the bands for the Dick Cavett and Merv Griffin Shows. He has been named number one jazz trombonist for seven consecutive years in Down Beat's Reader's Poll and won the magazine's Critics Awards twice. Bill is an active performer and has recorded nine albums - his second was nominated for a Grammy. His appearance at the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival is sponsored by Ted Brown Music Company.

Growing up in a family of musicians where both his dad and brother played drums, Brian Bromberg began his career at the very young age of thirteen, as a drummer. At fourteen, Brian began his classical training on bass. Only a few years later, he was one of the most respected and talked about musicians in the business. By age nineteen, Brian was touring the world with Stan Getz, performed at Carnegie Hall, and has since played and recorded with many jazz greats including Horace Silver, Monty Alexander, Dave Grusin, Dizzy Gillespie, Richie Cole, Joe Farrell, Lee Ritenour, and Freddie Hubbard. A gifted musician, composer, arranger, producer, and performer, Brian reaches unprecedented melodic and technical heights with a variety of acoustic and electric basses including fretted, fretless, piccolo, upright, and synth. Brian's popularity is rapidly increasing and he is being recognized as one of the finest lead bass players of this generation.



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
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Ron Aprea, composer/arranger/producer/saxophonist/ clarinetist/flutist, has studied with Phil Woods, Frank Foster, Bob Tricarico, Lee Koenitz, Harold Bennett, and Leon Russianoff. He has performed with Woody Herman, Tito Puente, Frank Foster, Lionel Hampton, and Louis Armstrong to name a few. While with Hamp's band, some of the highlights were an appearance on the Paul Anka Telethon in New York, the Ramsey Lewis television special in Chicago, and a recorded concert at the Smithsonian Institute, where Ron's solos were taped and put into their Archives. Ron was also the featured soloist and arranger for performances with Nat Adderley at the world-famous Apollo Theatre, and he also performed at the Paramount Theatre with King Curtis' Big Band. Ron has also played shows for literally hundreds of stars, including Sid Caesar, Connie Francis, Clint Holmes, Rita Moreno, Robert Merrill, Chita Rivera, George Goebel, Rich Little, and Billy Eckstine. In 1974, Ron stepped out of the jazz scene for a minute and recorded with John Lennon and Elton John on the album entitled "Walls and Bridges." The all-star horn section on that date included Howard Johnson, Frank Vicari, and Steve Madeo. Ron was a featured soloist on the jazz-gospel album "Free to Be Free," and wrote, arranged, and produced his own album, "Positive Energy...Volume I." Ron had his own television special on WNYC, and was a featured soloist on Broadway's "Song of Singapore." Ron's compositions, arrangements, and production skills can be heard on Angela DeNiro's CD, "Just for the Fun of It," as well as her new venture, "Angela DeNiro...Swingin' With Legends," to be released in 1998.

"I always thought the ultimate would be to play a cross between Oscar Peterson and Bill Evans," says Billy. "To have Oscar's smoking, burning ability to swing, with all his facility, while still being able to have a harmonic concept like Bill Evans-that would please me." With Hamp, his debut recording with Contemporary, he demonstrates how thoroughly he has integrated those ideals into his own distinctive style. Although not widely known outside of the south Florida scene where he has lived and performed for the past 23 years, Marcus has been gradually expanding his sphere of influence. He began as a trumpet and then trombone player, but during his college years in Massachusetts decided* to switch to the piano. "It took me five years to realize how much I hated " playing the trombone," he quips. In 1974, after moving back to Florida he got a job playing in a "dumpy airport bar" and within a year, the Traveler's Lounge became the hottest jazz club in Miami. He has since been called "Miami's favorite jazz pianist" by the Miami News. Billy appears with the following soloists from the Florida jazz scene, many of whom are featured on his recording, Hamp: Brenda Alford, vocals; John Allred, trombone; Pete Minger, trumpet; Billy Ross, tenor saxophone & alto flute; Eric Allison, flute, clarinet, saxophone; John Michalak, tenor saxophone; Turk Mauro, baritone saxophone; Don Coffman, bass; Gary Duchaine, drums.

Born in Vincennes, Indiana, Jane started piano study at age nine. She auditioned to appear on a kiddie's radio program and stayed on as staff-pianist. In high school she appeared in theatricals with Karl Malden and Red Skelton. Jane received scholarships to attend Bush Conservatory, Chicago Conservatory and DePaul University School of Music. Many years later, she graduated from Pace University in New York City. Jane was an organist for the Milwaukee Braves for 10 years and for the New York Mets for 16 years, during a time when her jazz career was also expanding. She appeared with Eddie South, Milt Hinton, Grady Tate, Clark Terry's Big Band, Major Holley and Lionel Hampton. As a composer-lyricist, she coauthored with Lionel Hampton, Johnny Hodges, Roy Eldridge, Steve Allen, Clark Terry and Jess Stacy. She has recorded with Tommy Newsom, Grady Tate, Jake Hanna and other jazz luminaries. In November of 1994, Jazz Music Education, Inc., initiated the first annual "Jane Jarvis Jazz Invitational" with proceeds going to the Jane Jarvis Piano Scholarship Fund.

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Dee Daniels has an amazing four octave range that developed as she sang gospel music in her father's church choir in Oakland, California. Her talent made its mark at a very young age and she continued to develop her love for music as she entered the University of Montana where she founded, directed, wrote arrangements for and accompanied the university's noted Black Ensemble Gospel Choir. In 1972, she joined "Dynamite," an established group in the Seattle area, and introduced her gospel roots to the more commercial areas of rhythm and blues, soul, and rock. By 1974, Dee's reputation had extended to California where she was invited to appear at a popular Hollywood nightclub. She stayed for one year, performing at other clubs, playing concerts, and recording backing vocals for many artists, as well as jingles for national products and companies. Dee returned to Seattle and during the next four years she captivated capacity crowds while fronting trios, quartets, big bands, and performing solo. She enjoyed regular radio and television exposure and was honored with several civic and national awards for her music. By 1979, Dee was beginning to be recognized as a "jazz singer" by the public and critics alike. In 1982, she began a five-year stint in Europe where she performed with many of the jazz greats, including Ernestine Anderson and the late Sarah Vaughn. Today, Dee Daniels makes her home in Vancouver, B.C. and her voice and presence continue to make an international statement while she performs around the world where every performance ends with a standing ovation.



Greg Abate is noted by jazz reviewers as one of the best Be Bop alto players today. Audiences and reviewers also attest that his playing is sincere, intense and swinging. Greg sounds like Greg although he has overtones of Phil Woods, Jackie McLean, Dick Johnson, Art Pepper, and Charlie Parker. The Chicago Tribune wrote, "Greg is not content to rely on stock be bop riffs and standard chord progressions, rather the sharp angularity of his phrases and often startling pauses give his work a feeling of constant creativity." Greg's career began with a two year stint with Ray Charles playing lead alto after finishing at Berklee College of Music in 1971. Greg went on to play tenor saxophone with Dick Johnson and the Artie Shaw Orchestra and was also a member of the Duke Belaire Orchestra. Greg has numerous recordings on the Blue Chip and Candid Labels which have included special guests Claudio Roditi, Hilton Ruiz, George Mraz, Kenny Washington, James Williams, Rufus Reid, Red Rodney and Mickey Roker among others. Greg continues to play major jazz clubs and festivals in the United States and Europe. Greg is a Selmar clinician and a member of the IAJE.





Wally "Gator" Watson, born Wesley Watson, is the son of the late jazz drummer Wesley B. Landers, former drummer for Dinah Washington, Sonny Stitt, Jimmy Luncerford, and many others. Having entered the professional entertainment field at age 15, Gator is presently celebrating his 30th year in the business. His experience in the business has touched upon every aspect of the business, from the famed New York City night club scene, to the Broadway Theater Venues. From radio, TV, and film, both as a player and an air personality, to the most famed concert halls and arenas in the world, Wally has toured with some of the most well-known and respected names and productions in music.

Saxophonist/composer and arranger Lance Bryant comes out of Markahm, Illinois, a small town near Chicago. He received his music education at Berklee College of Music in Boston, where he studied saxophone and composition. During his tenure at Berklee, Lance fostered musical relationships with fellow classmates saxophonist Branford Marsalis, drummer Marvin "Smitty" Smith, trumpeter Wallace Roney, and other renowned musicians. In 1986, Lance received a National Endowment of the Arts Study Fellowship, which enabled him to study saxophone and arranging privately with Frank Foster, former director of the Count Basie Orchestra. A resident of the New York metropolitan area since 1986, Lance has been freelancing, recording, and touring with some of today's most prominent jazz artists - Steve Coleman, Monte Croft, Graham Haynes, Lonnie Plaxico, Lionel Hampton and others. Spare time often finds Lance teaching saxophone and jazz at New York City's Jazz Mobile workshops or as an artist-in-residence for the New Jersey State Council on the Arts. Lance made his musical film debut in Spike Lee's feature film, Malcolm X. Since 1990, Lance has toured extensively throughout the United States, Europe and Japan with Phyllis Hyman, "Bootsy" Collins, Cindy Blackman, Abdullah Ibrahim, Pete LaRocca and the Lionel Hampton Orchestra. He currently serves as the Orchestra's Musical Director and Principle Arranger. Lances work as an arranger is featured on the recent Lionel Hampton release entitled For the Love of Music (MoJazz records).

Noted jazz critic Nat Hentoff wrote, "John Stowell can make an electric guitar sound like a singing voice." Experts throughout the world have echoed that praise. The esteem John holds among his peers makes him in demand for recording and performance dates with, among others, Milt Jackson, Art Farmer, Conte Condoli, Herb Ellis, Bill Watrous, Pete Christlieb, Billy Higgins, Billy Hart, Richie Cole, Ralph Towner, and Scott Hamilton. For seven years, John and virtuoso bassist David Friesen toured extensively to critical acclaim everywhere from Australia to New York. With flutist Paul Horn, he and David Friesen were the first American jazzmen invited to perform in Russia in more than forty years. John has played many of the international jazz festivals, including Newport, Monterey, Telluride, Arcosante, Molde (Norway), Berlin, and others and taught as either a faculty member or clinician, at Manhattan School of Music, the Westchester Conservatory, Berklee College of Music, and the National Jazz Educators Convention. He spends much of each year doing clinics, workshops, and performances for colleges throughout the United States and Canada and is on the adjunct faculty of Marylhurst College in Portland



Seduced by the sounds of great jazz on the Voice of America radio network, pianist Andrei Kitaev made the long journey from Moscow, Russia to pursue the creative freedom of the music he loved. A gifted child, he was admitted to the Gnessen School of Music, Moscow's equivalent of New York's Juilliard, at the age of six. Due in part to the classical training he received in his native country, Kitaev was offered a recording contract by Reference Records almost immediately after settling in the San Francisco Bay Area. His first album "First Takes" debuted in 1978, but it wasn't until 11 years later, after moving to Portland, Oregon, that his second album "Yesterdays" was released. A member of the Oregon Arts Commission's "Oregon on Tour" program, he was featured in an hour long segment of "PDX: Jazz Summit," an eight part television series produced and aired by Oregon Public Broadcasting. In 1990, he was named "Most Outstanding New Artist" by the Portland Music Association, winning one of the first "Crystal Awards" ever presented.


Angela DeNiro, a native New Yorker, earned her degree in Music, and is a competent composer and arranger, as well as vocalist. In addition to Angela's jazz singing and scatting abilities, she has also done extensive studio work, with various jingles to her credit. Ms. DeNiro has just completed her second CD, to be entitled "Angela DeNiro...Swingin' With Legends." Billy took up fiddle at the age of six, because he wanted to "make sparks fly" from the instrument as he had once seen Charlie Daniels do on television. Thus began an exciting musical odyssey which garnered him-by the time he was 10 years old-a recording session and subsequent album release, national and local TV appearances, a wealth of fiddle championship titles throughout the country, numerous live club and concert dates, and performances with some of Nashville's greatest artists and pickers. While Billy loves to improvise and has favorite tunes he likes to play, he is currently most interested in swing and jazz stylings. He's even begun composing some of his own music. In September of 1995 at a Nashville concert, Billy was introduced backstage by Mark O'Connor, one of America's premier musicians, to the late Stephane Grappelli, who was the world's greatest jazz violinist. Upon Mark's urging, Billy had the opportunity to play a tune for the great maestro, using O'Connor's own fiddle. In 1996, Billy travelled to Weiser, Idaho, for the first time and captured the prestigious National Old Time Junior Junior Fiddle Championship. At the age of 12, he most recently opened for jazz legend Lionel Hampton at the Blue Note and was featured with Hamp's orchestra.



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
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
GUEST ARTISTS' BIOGRAPHIES

Chip Deffaa is the ASCAP-Deems Taylor Award-winning jazz critic of the New York Post and a regular contributor to Entertainment Weekly. He has written about music for magazines worldwide, including England's Crescendo, Canada's Coda, Japan's Swing Journal, and Americas' Down Beat, Living Blues, and Jazz Times. He also contributed to the landmark New Grove Dictionary of Jazz. At Princeton University, Deffaa was a student of distinguished Ferris Professor of Journalism, Irving Dilliard. He is a trustee of The Princeton Tiger magazine today. In addition, Deffaa has been a radio host, and in partnership with his sister, Deborah, a cable television producer. He is the author of such books about jazz (all of which are currently in print) as Voices of the Jazz Age (published in the United States by the University of Illinois Press and in Great Britain by the Bayou Press), which was a finalist for the Excellence in Recorded Sound Reserach Award of the American Association for Recorded Sound Collections; and Swing Legacy, Traditionalists and Revivalists in Jazz, and In the Mainstream, (published in the United States and Great Britain by the Scarecrow Press). His specialty is preserving the oral histories of veteran jazz artists.



A Berkeley native, Mr. Elwood has been a popular music critic and columnist for the San Francisco Examiner for 30 years. Since 1965 he has been a professor of history and music history in the Peralta Colleges, Oakland, CA. He has taught and lectured in the field of popular music, jazz, blues, etc. at Sonoma State University, University of California (Berkeley), San Francisco State University, and Diablo Valley College. Mr. Elwood's radio career in jazz and blues programming began in the late 1940s; he has been a jazz program producer and announcer, a regular participant in radio and television programs in the San Francisco area, an advisor to a number of PBS music specials and is on the NARAS (Grammy) selection panel for the Hall of Fame awards. Elwood's enthusiasm for vernacular American music developed during his secondary school years in Berkeley. His record collection is considered among the most complete in the west totaling about 50,000 discs as well as a few thousand cylinders, piano rolls, etc. He is a frequent contributor to music magazines and journals and has written hundreds of linernotes for record albums. He travels widely and often in the world of jazz, blues, and popular music and has attended most of the jazz and blues festivals in this country and many abroad. He is a pianist and drummer and a good friend of most of the musicians who have either passed through the Bay Area or who are part of the large community of performers in the greater Bay Area. Elwood graduated from the University of California in Berkeley, began graduate work there (in U.S. History) then completed his Master's degree at Stanford.
