Plant a minimum of five acres of small grains Attend the annual field tour of small grain projects and give an oral presentation on cultural practices (what it takes to produce the crop) during the tour. Have an up-to-date record book available for review during the field tour. Close, summarize, and turn in project to the County Extension Office on or before the county fair, if crop is harvested by that time. If crop is harvested after the fair turn in project on or before December 30 of the current calendar year. AND If raising malting barley, an individual contract with the malting barley company is required. Seed source and grain variety must be approved by the malting barley contract. Give an oral presentation (speech, demonstration or illustrated talk) related to this project.
