
# 2024 - 2025TREASURE VALLEY DAIRY REPLACEMENT HEIFER PROJECT **APPLICATION** PACKET









The Treasure Valley Dairy Replacement Heifer Project is open to participants from Ada, Canyon, Gem, Payette, Washington, Valley, and Owyhee counties. The purpose of the program is to increase knowledge and interest in the dairy industry, as well as enhance life skills among youth in the Treasure Valley.

Youth go through an application process in which they must understand, and agree to the rules and guidelines of the project. They purchase a heifer calf that has been provided by an area dairy producer to the TVDRHP program.

Program participants will halter-break, feed, and manage their heifer as described in the project guidelines for approximately 16 months. During this period of ownership, youth have an opportunity to develop skills in financing, budgeting, record keeping, nutritional management, reproductive management, selection, and showmanship of dairy animals.

There are numerous clinics, tours, and workshops available throughout the year for participants. In addition, farm visits are conducted by committee members to monitor progress and offer useful advice.

Finally, heifers will be sold as two-year old bred or "springer" heifers. The sale is scheduled to occur at the Western Idaho Fair in August.

This program is for Treasure Valley Dairy Replacement Heifer Program participants who have been in the program for at least 3 years. This program has been created to challenge members to become more acquainted with the local dairymen and have a bigger challenge in selecting your project heifer from a larger group of heifers.

You will need to contact your dairymen and get a heifer that was born between September 15 and November 15 of the previous year. This date must be before Selection Day as you will be required to come to Selection Day with your heifer. When you pick up your heifer you will be required to obtain all documents necessary on your heifer for the program.


On Selection Day you will pay for your heifer after her weight is determined and have your heifer checked by the veterinarian.

For the past several summers, a group of individuals separate from the TVDRHP Committee has held a golf scramble to raise money for the TVDRHP program. The goal of this group is to raise money to help kids participate in the project who otherwise could not participate due to the financial burden. In 2024, there will be up to five scholarships, depending on participation and market prices to be used toward the purchase of a heifer. Scholarships are awarded one time only per participant.

The TVDRHP Committee is offering a second financial assistance option in the form of a \$500 loan to be repaid without interest when the heifer is sold in August 2025. First preference will be given to first time applicants. Returning applicants may apply.

All applicants will need to complete the attached balance sheet and projected budget to be considered for financial assistance.

Selection of recipients will be based on your answers to: the questions on this page, your essay question on page five of the application, completeness of balance sheet and projected budget, and the recommendations. Please take your time and complete the application to the best of your ability!

On a separate piece of paper, please answer the following questions.

- 1. Please explain why you need the scholarship or interest free loan and where the rest of the money will come from to purchase and care for the heifer? You may use a balance sheet and projected budget as examples for your financial assistance request.
- 2. If you are selected to participate in the program, how would you help promote the dairy industry in Idaho?
- 3. How would you contribute to the TVDRHP beyond participation in the program?

If I am selected by the Heifer Committee to receive an interest free loan to assist in purchasing my heifer, I agree that \$500 will be taken out of my sale check in August 2025 to repay the loan.

### Treasure Valley Dairy Replacement Heifer Project RULES AND GUIDELINES



#### I. COMMITTEE

- A. The committee will be made up of dairy producers, extension educators, 4-H dairy leaders, FFA advisors, industry representatives and other interested persons.
- B. The responsibilities of the committee include:
  - 1. Meeting together as needed to discuss the program and its policies.
  - 2. Establishing policies for the program.
  - 3. Assisting with activities supporting the program.
  - 4. Securing calves for the program from dairy producers.
  - 5. Setting price at which participants will purchase heifers.
  - 6. Updating all application materials.
  - 7. Planning educational activities.
  - 8. Screening applicants to determine final eligibility.
  - 9. Gathering information for and printing sale book.
  - 10. Securing a floor price.
  - 11. Making arrangements for a facility for the sale.
  - 12. Securing an auctioneer.
  - 13. Determining rules and guidelines for sale procedure.
  - 14. Serve as a mentor for participants as needed.

#### II. REQUIREMENTS FOR CALF PRIOR TO PURCHASE

- A. Dams shall be 100% of herd average and have no major faults.
- B. All attempts will be made to select heifers who's sires are a registered, proven A.I. stud.
- C. All attempts will be made that calves shall have been born between September 15 and November 15, 2023.
- D. Calf should be structurally sound, in good health, and have good dairy character.
- E. Crossbred heifers should be all dairy breeds with no beef influence.
- F. Breeders shall be on milk test and supply the following information:
  - 1. Name and address
  - 2. Calf birth date
  - 3. Calf breed
  - 4. Registration of calf (if applicable)
  - 5. Sire of calf
  - 6. Ear tattoo recorded if calf has already been vaccinated
  - 7. Dam of calf
  - 8. Complete lactation records of dam (days in milk, number times milked per day, pounds milk produced, pounds fat produced, test for lactation)

G. All heifers will be Brucellosis vaccinated between **three (3)** and **twelve (12)** months of age if not already done by the producer. The committee will arrange to give to the tattoos and dehorn. The tattoo should be legible in natural light. Check tattoos one to two months following purchase of the heifer to insure legibility. If the tattoo is not legible, contact the veterinarian who vaccinated the calf. Sometimes the tattoo can be reapplied but not if you wait too long.

#### III. REQUIREMENTS OF PARTICIPANTS

A. Must be a <u>currently enrolled</u> 4-H or FFA member. Seniors in high school that will be the age of 18 at the time of the sale will be eligible, if present for the duration of the project and to sell their heifer. Juniors in high school are also eligible, if they will be present for the duration of the project and to sell their heifer.

1. REMINDER: All 4-H participants need to enroll into their own counties dairy project. Participating in the TVDRHP does not automatically enroll you into the dairy project.

- B. Have adequate facilities and feed for raising the heifer for 16 months.
- C. Have parent and leader/advisor support.
- D. Qualified applicants who have never had a project heifer and former participants not currently owning a heifer in the project will be given first priority.
- E. Acceptance by the committee does not guarantee that you will receive a heifer. The committee will make every possible effort to secure heifers for the project members. In the event that the committee is unable to secure a sufficient quantity of heifers, some acceptable applicants might be dropped. (This hasn't happened yet, but be aware that the possibility does exist.)
- F. In the case that there are a limited number of heifers returning participants may not receive a heifer. *The committee may grant exceptions to this due to circumstance.* The purpose of this is to allow all youth who would like to participate in the project a chance to do so.

#### PURCHASING OF CALVES

- G. Selection of a heifer will be made at a central location in April 2024 using a random drawing process. Three heifers will be randomly selected to be in the sale ring. Then a youth will be randomly selected to pick one heifer, and they will exit the sale ring. Another heifer and youth will be randomly selected and put in the ring, and the process repeated until every participant has a heifer.
- H. Buyers agree to pay sellers the sale price, which will be the present market price and set by the committee, on Selection Day and have arrangements made to take the calf home that day. Price is determined by the committee and is based on current market conditions.
- I. Calves are not guaranteed to be registered.
- J. Each participant can purchase only one heifer each year as part of the project. Youth can participate in consecutive years.
- K. The committee will make every effort to accommodate the breed preference of the participant. It can be hard to find enough Jersey heifers for all requests. Preference will be given to young or first-time participants and participants who have not requested or received a Jersey in the past. Other participants will be given the opportunity to purchase a Holstein heifer.

#### IV. RESPONSIBILITY OF PARTICIPANT

- A. Remove extra teats.
- B. Provide adequate care and feeding of the heifer to ensure health and proper weight for breeding. Large breeds should weigh approximately 800-900 pounds depending on frame size of the animal. Small breeds should weigh approximately 600-700 pounds depending on frame size of the animal. Heifers who do not make proper weight may not get bred due to size.
- C. Place magnet in heifer first year.
- D. Heifer will be bred following the guidelines set by the committee. First service will be approximately December 1, 2024. Artificial insemination to the same breed is required for a minimum of first three services, following that, a bull may be used after notifying the committee. If the producer has requested the animal be bred to a different breed it must be approved by the committee prior to breeding. Use of heat synchronization is your option. Heifers can be sent to a heifer raising operation in Parma for the breeding season. Mann's will pregnancy test at 40 and 60 days and notify the a committee member immediately of the results. Hauling the heifer directly to a veterinarian's office is much cheaper than a farm call. If breeding at home, pregnancy checks are your responsibility. Second pregnancy check needs to be done by or at the May clinic.
- E. A committee member and/or 4-H leader/FFA Advisor may visit in the early spring and/or late fall to check on the heifer. Have the checklist ready and be able to give an oral report about your heifer. These visits may occur both years of ownership. A written report on your heifer and her progress will be required by the end of June and September of 2024 and February, and May of 2025. This report will be forwarded to the dairyman and mentor. <u>All of the reports must be turned in to be eligible to sell.</u>
- F. Provide information on heifer, her dam, and service sire for sale book to the committee **by date set by committee** of sale year. The committee will supply an information form for you to fill out. *THE 2024-25 DEADLINE IS JULY 01, 2025.*
- G. Show heifer at your county fair or the Western Idaho Fair (WIF) first year of ownership (it is strongly encouraged you show your heifer at the WIF the first year as many of the producers and potential buyers of your heifer will be in attendance and it will be a good opportunity for them to see your heifer and inquire on her progress). Must show at WIF second year of ownership in order to sell. Your county fair in second year is optional. Attendance at the Meridian Dairy Show in June of <u>both</u> years is <u>required</u>. If not in attendance at either year's Meridian Dairy Days show, all moneys from the Meridian Dairy Days board, if given, will be forfeited. Attendance at all other educational events sponsored by the committee is required.
- H. If the 4-H or FFA member is unable to continue raising the heifer, it may be turned over to another 4-H or FFA member with arrangements determined prior to the exchange for the sale price and/or division of profits. The committee must be notified **<u>BEFORE</u>** any exchange takes place.
- I. If problems arise, don't wait until the week before fair to notify the committee there is a problem. It is your responsibility to let the committee know immediately when problems arise.
- J. Failure to comply with <u>ANY</u> rules in Section IV will void the contract and participants' right to sell their heifer in the Dairy Replacement Sale. The participant shall not be allowed to buy a heifer for one year.

#### SELLING OF THE HEIFER

- K. All heifers will be sold at the TVDRHP sale held during the Western Idaho Fair (WIF) in the second year of ownership. Pregnancy check and ear tattoo confirmation will be required. You must exhibit your heifer at the WIF during the second year of ownership to be eligible to sell.
- L. Any heifer calving early due to accidental early breeding (i.e. neighbor's bull gets out) still must be sold in the sale with the new calf considered separate from the heifer and owned by the participant currently raising the animal. The owner has the option whether to include the calf in the sale or keep it. The committee shall be notified and will address each situation individually.
- M. Heifers will sell as determined by random drawing.
- N. The committee will handle all money.
- O. The producers of the TVDRHP who enroll heifers are very interested in buying their heifer to put back in the herd. Make every effort to make the producer proud.
- P. A 5% commission on the heifer sale price will be assessed to each seller to cover sale and project expenses.

#### V. WHAT TO DO IF YOU HAVE PROBLEMS

- A. If a heifer dies, participants have the option of taking ownership of a project heifer if available or collecting insurance money. This decision must be validated through the grievance policy process. All other situations will be considered by the committee using the following guidelines.
- B. Taking ownership of a project heifer due to death or no successful breeding, must be completed through the grievance process. All other situations will be considered by the committee using the following guidelines.
- C. The committee is responsible for final decisions regarding policy disputes.
- D. All grievances must be submitted in writing to the committee, including:
  - 1. Name of complainant
  - 2. Statement of complaint
  - 3. Date of complaint
  - 4. Signature of 4-H Leader or FFA Advisor
- E. All grievances must be turned in to the Canyon County Extension Office no less than ten (10) days after the incident occurred.
- F. A committee meeting must be called within 14 days of the grievance. All committee members must be notified, and at least three members of the committee must be present to validate the decision.
- G. The committee decision will be returned to the complainant in writing within five (5) days after the meeting.
- H. Any committee member associated closely with the grievance, compromising their position, should abstain from voting.
- I. All committee decisions are final.


<sup>2</sup> Veterinary home calls are more costly than hauling a heifer to the clinic. This cost reflects taking the heifer to the clinic for preg checks.
