Record Books and Involvement Reports: We are happy to help with record books and involvement reports on Zsuite. Record book help days are scheduled on Mondays from 10-12 pm (July 1, 8, 15, 22).

Completed record book and Involvement report for all non-animal projects must be turned in on Tuesday August 6th at your interview with the judge. At that time, you will present your project, your record book and involvement report. Once you have received a ribbon for your project you will note in your record book the type of ribbon you received. The record book will be collected for judging and your project displayed for the rest of the fair. Non-animal record books will be judged the week of August 11-17 and awards will be presented at the 4-H awards ceremony scheduled for September 23rd, 2024.

Shooting sports record books and involvement report will be collected on August 6th during non-animal judge interviews. Record books must be turned in by 12 PM August 6th at the Fair Grounds. All shooting sports ribbons will be displayed at the fair. When turning in your record book please note the type of ribbon you received for the fair shoot. Shooting Sports record books will be judged the week of August 11-17 and awards will be presented at the 4-H awards ceremony scheduled for September 23rd, 2024.

Animal and Livestock record books and involvement reports must be turned into UI Extension office no later than 4pm August 15^{th} . Please ensure that you have recorded all competition ribbons and all information on the livestock sale in your record book and involvement report. Add pictures taken at the fair too. Animal and livestock record books will be judged the week of August 18-24 and awards will be presented at the 4-H awards ceremony scheduled for September 23^{rd} , 2024.

If you are taking an animal project to the Eastern Idaho State Fair, your record book and involvement report are due to the UI Extension office by 4 PM on September 12th, 2024. Please ensure that you have recorded all competition ribbons in your record book and involvement report. Add pictures too. Eastern Idaho State Fair animal and livestock record books will be judged the week of September 15-20 and awards will be presented at the 4-H awards ceremony scheduled for September 23rd, 2024.

UI Extension Teton County 4-H will **NOT** be printing record books or involvement reports, there will be a **\$5.00 printing charge** for all printing done at UI Extension. Ensure all printing costs are recorded in record books.

Fair Registration Papers: We are sure you have been working hard on your 4-H club projects, and animals. The 4-H staff, leaders, Livestock Sale Committee and Teton County Fair Board are busy planning for the upcoming Teton County Fair. Now it's time to register your entries. Avian Influenza in Idaho Information for bird owners

Avian influenza (AI) is a virus which can infect all birds. Domesticated birds may become infected through direct contact with infected waterfowl or other infected poultry, or through contact with surfaces that have been contaminated with the viruses.

Two different strains:

*Both strains can occur naturally in wild migratory waterfowl.

- Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) these virus strains are deadly to domestic poultry and can spread rapidly from flock to flock. This is a reportable disease. Disease can be slow and mild in waterfowl.
- Low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) these virus strains are most likely to be carried by wild migratory waterfowl and shorebirds without causing illness. LPAI can infect domestic poultry. Symptoms are usually milder.

How is HPAI Spread?

- HPAI is spread by direct contact between birds, by coughing and sneezing and through poop.
- People can spread HPAI by moving infected birds, moving contaminated equipment and feed, and by wearing clothing and shoes that have been in contact with infected birds.

Symptoms Include:

Sudden death without clinical signs

- Lack of energy and appetite
- Decreased egg production or softshelled or misshapen eggs
- Swelling of head, comb, eyelid, wattles and hocks
- Purple discoloration of wattles, comb and legs
- Nasal discharge, coughing and sneezing
- Incoordination

Report Sick Birds

- If you have multiple sick or dying birds, call a local veterinarian, or refer to ISDA's avian influenza flow chart for reporting guidance.
- The avian influenza flow chart and bird owner reporting form can be found at <u>agri.idaho.gov.</u>

Poultry owners and growers are encouraged to always practice good biosecurity to prevent the spread of AI. Visit agri.idaho.gov for more information.
