2024 Rinker Rock Creek Ranch Internship

The University of Idaho is seeking a student to assist with research, outreach, and ranch operations at Rinker Rock Creek Ranch. The ranch is a 20,000-acre property west of Bellevue, ID managed in cooperation with The Nature Conservancy and the Wood River Land Trust and located within a 40-min drive of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. Interns will work with a team of researchers, graduate students, ranch staff, and partner organization staff on projects related to wildlife resources, livestock management, rangeland monitoring, and riparian restoration. This position is an exceptional opportunity to broaden a student's professional network and gain hands-on experience in the field.
