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Growing high-altitude master gardener program through collaboration

AT A GLANCE

Piloted in Blaine, Teton and Valley Countries, the adoption of web conferencing technology enable educators to offer the first high-altitude short season master gardener course in Idaho.

The Situation

Extension community education programs have a strong tradition of providing in-person classes. While this remains the preferred method of learning for Idaho residents (according to the 2023 statewide listening session), 40% of learners indicated they are very interested in hybrid classroom learning environments.

Since 2014, Extension has been implementing a virtual hybrid distributed conference and classroom model. The hybrid delivery of Extension programs has been successful in reaching larger rural audiences, using fewer staff and resources while providing specialist and horticultural knowledge to rural communities across the nation. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, a local fa-

cilitator was required to coordinate the technology needed for a distributed conference model. However, post-pandemic, familiarity with web conferencing technology has become widespread among the public. This cultural shift enabled the first-ever statewide coordinated effort to offer a hybrid master gardener learning experience focused on the high-altitude regions of Idaho.

Our Response

In 2024, under the leadership of Ron Patterson and Lena Allen in Bonneville County, the Idaho Master Gardener Program launched a statewide effort to standardize the foundational content of the program through the development of an online class on the Canvas learning platform. This course created consistent and convenient learning experiences for rural Idaho participants, which can be implemented by any University of Idaho Extension educator. Educators in Blaine, Teton and

Valley counties used this online course to create a customized hybrid course tailored to the specific needs of high-altitude regions with short growing seasons.

Students could access the virtual classroom asynchronously, following the foundational content in Canvas at their own pace. The high-altitude Idaho Master Gardener Program course also included 13 remote synchronous "lunch and learn" weekly meetings, offering peer-to-peer participant learning via Zoom. Each county was responsible for planning and hosting in-person classes with local stakeholders throughout the course. Idaho master gardeners are required to contribute volunteer hours to their communities, with local volunteer opportunities coordinated during the summer and fall.

Program Outcomes

The overall experience of participating in the hybrid Idaho Master Gardener Program course was measured through a pilot pre- and post-course survey. Of the participants, 69% rated the class as excellent, 23% as good and 8% as average. The primary outcomes of intended behavior change indicated that 92% of participants planned to manage invasive and noxious weeds and grow their gardens in raised beds. Additionally, 85% of participants planned to implement mulching, landscape planning, vegetable gardening and establish season-extension infrastructure in their gardens.

There was a 77% increase in knowledge about the role of Cooperative Extension in their communities and the various programs available through University of Idaho Extension.

The mean score comparisons of the pre- and post-class surveys indicated that learning increased more in some areas

than in others. The topics with the most significant increases in knowledge included pesticides, diagnosing plant problems, turf management, season extension, pathology and growing in micro-climates.

Percentage increase in knowledge gained:

- 76% Pesticides
- 77% Diagnosing plant problems
- 85% Turf management
- 85% Season extension
- 89% Pathology
- 99% Growing in micro-climates

In October 2024, these findings were presented at the American Association for Adult and Continuing Education Virtual Conference.

The Future

The high-altitude educators aim to formalize their pilot survey tool for a statewide audience. Working in collaboration with Ron Patterson and Lena Allen for access to statewide data via the Canvas e-learning course, further research will explore the impacts of the Idaho Master Gardener Program statewide. Institutional Review Board approval for a paired t-test quantitative analysis will be pursued through partnership and collaboration in 2026.

Cooperators and Co-Sponsors

The high-altitude short-season Idaho Master Gardener Program would not have been possible without the hard work and dedication of Bonneville County master gardener staff and Erin Doty, the director of Extension publishing and Extension online education. Working together, they established the online Idaho Master Gardener Program course on Canvas, laying a firm foundation for program quality, accessibility and increased capacity for the Idaho Master Gardener Program statewide.

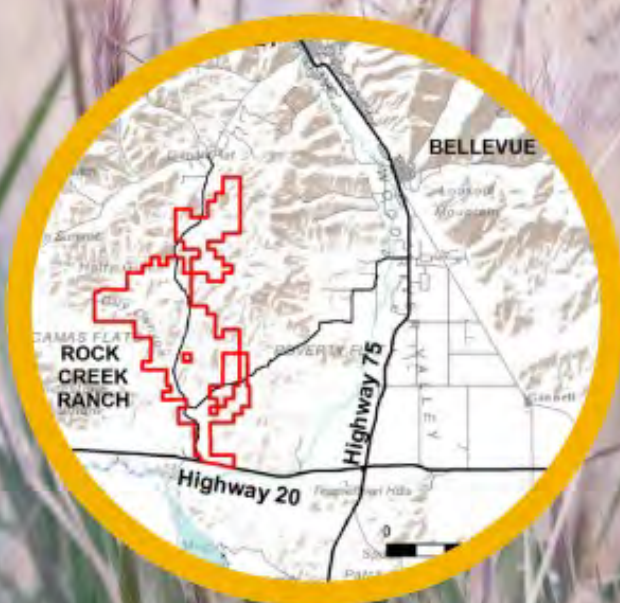

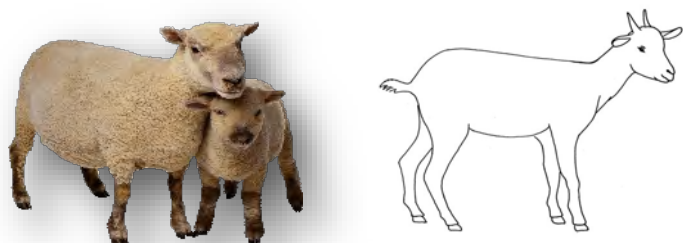
Required Information: All paperwork must include:

THE KIDS ARE ALL RIGHT: 4-H, FFA POSITION STUDENTS FOR SUCCESS IN A CHANGING LANDSCAPE

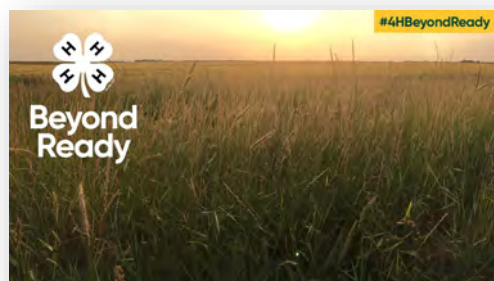

With 6 million young people participating in programs across all 50 states, 4-H is the largest youth development organization in the country. It was founded to instruct rural youth in improved farming and farm-homemaking practices through cooperative education at land grant universities.



The National FFA Organization, long known as Future Farmers of America, boasts 1 million members in grades 5-12 and college across all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. It also focuses on preparing kids for careers in agriculture, food systems and natural resources.

4-H's core programs "remain popular because they connect youth to their community and the land," says Jill Bramble, president and CEO of the National 4-H Council. "As the world of work continues to evolve, so do we." And that alone is a tremendous challenge. A Dell Technologies Research report from 2017 predicted that 85 percent of jobs that will exist in 2030 hadn't been created yet. As the agricultural field becomes increasingly high-tech and interconnected, it requires a well-rounded skill set. Both 4-H and FFA have pivoted their pro-



gramming accordingly.

Future-Proofing Farming

The biggest shift has been from a primarily production-agriculture focus to a broader scope that includes science, technology, engineering, business, and leadership aspects of agriculture.

"4-H is at the forefront of integrating emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, robotics and drones," Bramble says. "These innovations are transforming the future of agriculture and food systems."

4-H launched the Beyond Ready workforce readiness initiative last October with a goal of reaching 10 million youth annually by 2030, preparing rural, suburban, and urban students with the skills to tackle complex global challenges in sustainable agriculture and resource management. "Youth need to possess leadership, problem-solving, critical thinking and time-management skills," Bramble says. "They also need to learn how to leverage social media and marketing techniques to connect with consumers, employees, donors, and other stakeholders. "FFA has introduced more virtual, and hybrid learning options and updated competitive events by collaborating with industry partners for opportunities such as the National Turfgrass Science Invitational. FFA also offers international travel opportunities for its state officers to expose them to global agriculture. The organization is also expanding its efforts to create a more inclusive environment. "We've made significant strides over the past decade to adapt to a rapidly changing world while staying true to our mission of preparing students for leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education," says Christine White, FFA's chief program officer.

Youth Are Energized

Parents may worry about agriculture's perceived difficulties or lack of prestige, but it's a vibrant sector of the economy. And the employment outlook is strong: A 2024 report from Purdue University found that there are currently two open positions in agriculture for every qualified candidate. "With more than 350 careers in agriculture, there are many pathways for students to choose from that align with their passions," White says. Some students are inspired by entrepreneurial opportunities, while others are drawn to careers in financial literacy, marketing, and supply-chain management. "Agriculture resonates with this generation's desire to have careers with meaningful outcomes," White says. "They can see how their work directly impacts people,

whether it's improving food access, advancing environmental solutions or creating



technologies that shape the future."

Katie Culbert is a National 4-H Youth in Action winner and first-year student at Harvard University, where she's pursuing a dual major in biology and political science. "I don't think people realize that this industry is the world's largest employer and impacts lives on a huge scale," Culbert says. "I plan to pursue a career in agriculture because it means I will have the opportunity to make a direct impact on society and do my part to support food security." Culbert is most excited by opportunities in research and legislation and sees her pursuits as a continuation of her family's traditions. "My father and grandfather are both physicians. But my great-grandfather and my great-great-grandfather were farmers," she says. "I think my career will bring me full circle because the foundation of good health is
