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Reflections, gratitude, and positive momentum for UI Extension, Teton County

I naturally become more introspective and reflective this time of year as the month of November begins and mother nature begins to transition into winter. Summer and the start of the autumn season are a busy time for me and my family, with constant schlepping of little ones and juggling of schedules. The 2023 Extension year was equally busy with a record number of client contacts for our Extension office. From November 2022-October 2023 our office staff directly reached over 6,000 individuals through our 4-H and Extension programming (impressive considering Teton County has ~12,000 residents).

Our 4-H youth development program finished up two years of Idaho Health and Welfare grant projects to reduce youth learning loss during the pandemic, increase outreach to underserved youth, and increase STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) programming. Funding was available to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare through the U.S. American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), providing over \$2 million dollars towards 4-H youth development programs in the state of Idaho. Teton County 4-H received over \$125,000 in grant funds helping us to hire our first ever full-time 4-H coordi-

nator for Teton County and part-time 4-H support staff and AmeriCorps volunteers, increase 4-H enrollment and camp scholarships, purchase state of the art STEM equipment and supplies, and recruit talented 4-H volunteer club leaders. Our overall youth program participants grew by over 30% in the past year with a 142% increase in our STEM programs, made possible through the boon in staff capacity, but also through our Extension partnerships with our county government, local schools, and nonprofit organizations such as Above and Beyond the Classroom (ABC). We truly can accomplish great things when we work together!

As we move forward in the next year, our goal is to continue this great momentum and foster high-quality outreach and extension programs in our

Using a performance-based learning model for beginning farmer education program

AT A GLANCE

Performance based curriculum used to enhance core competencies skills of beginning farmers in Idaho.

The Situation

As small farms continue to increase in Idaho, beginning farmer education continues to be a need. Participant surveys from previous beginning farmer education programs indicated a need for more in-depth and hands-on education. With this task in mind, a team of Extension educators utilized the performance-based learning design to develop both online and hands-on education modules that could be used at various locations.

Our Response

Extension educators first met with farmer collaborators to help determine what beginning farmers need to know and to be able to do to have a more productive and efficient farm operation. This determined the primary topics to be addressed in the learning modules. Extension educators then researched and were trained on the performance-based learning model. Adult learning styles were reviewed and learning objectives that focused on what beginning farmers need to do with the information they learn were developed. Core competencies or skills that farmers should be able to complete as a result of our training were identified. Modules for both the online course and hands-on workshops were based around core competencies and

learning objectives. Modules incorporated assessment activities, practice activities and comprehension activities or presentations.

The online course curriculum focused on starting a small business in Idaho, market analysis, soils, climate assessment, irrigation, crop production planning, infrastructure needs and harvesting. This Zoom and online module class included presentations from Extension educators and farmers throughout the state to best address the needs of all participants. In class activities and homework addressed the assessment and practice activities. For the hands-on modules, the workshops were structured around the basic core competencies or skills that were identified as needs of beginning farmers. These workshops were offered

around Idaho at different teaching garden sites. Some were offered at a university-run teaching market garden, others were held on farmer-collaborator sites, while others were held in a community garden setting. For all modules, participants were surveyed at the completion of the module. The survey asked participants to describe their knowledge on topics related to the module, as well as their confidence in their ability or preparedness to perform a related activity or skill.

Program Outcomes

The online webinar course had 35 participants in 2021 and 24 in 2022. Based on pre and post surveys, knowledge related to the core competencies increased knowledge related to legal requirements for starting a produce business, farm recordkeeping for tax and legal purposes, market options for selling products, how to create a crop production plan to meet your market goals, factors to consider when deciding which crops to

grow, keeping crop production records, farm food safety practices, and how to determine what infrastructure you need for a safe and efficient harvest.

Confidence in participants' ability to perform competency skills was also measured and is displayed in the table.

For the hands-on workshops, preparedness such as preparedness to decide which soil health indicators are most useful for your situation and preparedness to take steps to improve your soil health. The majority of participants reported feeling moderately or very prepared for the soil health tasks covered in the workshop.

The Future

The goal is to further develop the curriculum to create a curriculum packet that would be useful to other educators. This would describe teaching farm models as well and workshop modules.

community. It is no doubt that the once “best kept secret” of youth development programming in our county—Teton County 4-H—is no longer a secret! Hundreds of Teton County youth are receiving the benefits of a superb and affordable out-of-school experience through 4-H. In our first week of 4-H enrollment in early October, several 4-H clubs were already at capacity. Additional 4-H volunteers are needed to help keep up with the demand. Teton County 4-H offers over 30 different 4-H clubs available to youth ages 5-18 led by community volunteers and Extension staff. Teton County 4-H is also continuing to bring afterschool STEM programming directly to ABC youth at the Driggs, Victor, and Tetonia locations.

In early October, we also said farewell to our beloved 4-H program assistant Sara Warhol who was instrumental in helping us execute youth development programs over the past year. Luckily, she is still

staying involved in 4-H as our volunteer 4-H Hiking Club leader and a 4-H parent. We also recently welcomed a new full-time 4-H AmeriCorps service member, William Weygint, who has a notable background in environmental education from the University of Idaho. He will be starting an Ecology and Conservation Club this winter and is assisting with our afterschool and day camp STEM programming.

For our adult Extension programs, we offered popular and new Extension courses in 2023 such as our six-class High-Altitude Victory Garden course and Introduction to High-Altitude Beekeeping Course partnering with Mountain Roots Education, reaching over 80 clients through the two courses. We also offered hands-on horticulture and small farm classes utilizing our raised garden beds and greenhouse at our Extension office. I collaborated with Extension faculty to deliver Cultivating Success™ Idaho programming for beginning agricultural and small acreage producers throughout the

state and continued the Agritourism in the Tetons Project with assistance from Teton Science School AmeriCorps members (visit tetonfoodfarmcoalition.org to learn more about this project and the work of the Teton Food and Farm Coalition). I am currently planning our winter Extension courses such as our Idaho Master Gardener volunteer program and Annie's Project (a farm business planning course catered towards women in agriculture). Stay tuned for enrollment and course updates in next month's newsletter! We are grateful for all our UI Extension supporters and volunteers and wish you all a wonderful season ahead. 
Many Dreams. One Love.

National 4-H week (October 1-7, 2023) kicked off the 2023-2024 4-H year. Teton County 4-H hit the ground running. Enrollment via Zsuite opened as planned on October 1st. Over a thousand fliers were distributed to the Elementary schools, Rendezvous Upper Elementary, Teton Middle School, and Teton High School. Families across the valley quickly began enrolling youth in 4-H. University of Idaho Extension staff were available to answer questions, assist with enrollment, and welcome new families to 4-H.

As of October 31st, 130 youth were enrolled in 4-H. Hiking Club, Yoga and Mindfulness Club, Cloverbud Yoga, and STEAM Homeschool and Afterschool clubs began meeting. Conservation and Ecology Club, Cooking Club, and Cloverbud STEAM Club will begin meeting in November. If you have signed up for a club, the Volunteer leader will be reaching out to you with club schedules, as they set the meeting times and locations.

ABC 4-H Wednesdays Partnership

The 2023-2024 academic and 4-H year are in full swing. 4-H has partnered with Above and Beyond the Classroom (ABC) to bring STEAM programming to underserved youth for the third year. Programming kicked off on October 4th at Driggs Elementary School. "Miss Abby" and "Mr. Will" launched "Power Protectors" National 2023-2024 STEM Challenge. The 2023-2024 4-H STEM Challenge "Power Protectors" focuses on renewable energy providing youth the fundamental knowledge of sustainable power sources, the energy people use daily, and the importance of using energy wisely. Children at ABC Driggs are participating in energy related activities designed with adaptability in mind so youth in kindergarten through third grade can participate together working in teams to save Energy Island. Superhero kids learned how to power superhero gadgets and protect the environment. They decided how to use electricity responsibly in their own Superhero Hideouts.

Youth participated in an epic engineering challenge. They discovered the engineering design process. They designed and built prototypes of solar, wind and hydro power sources and discovered how to energize their Superhero Hideout with renewable energy. Along the journey youth were able to study non-renewable power sources and discussed the benefits of both renewable and non-renewable energy sources.

During the last 2 weeks on Energy Island, Superhero Kids will play a collaborative board game. They will work as SUPER TEAMS to achieve a common goal and move Energy Island from unsustainable carbon-based energy use to renewable solar, wind and hydro power.

Victor and Tetonian ABC locations will also take part in 4-H STEM Challenges. In February Victor ABC students will take to the high seas and will participate in the 2022-2023 STEM Challenge "Explorers of the Deep". Tetonian ABC kids will launch into space in April with the 2021-2022 STEM Challenge "Galactic Quest".

We are in the process of finalizing plans for the 2023 4-H Shooting Sports Hunting Skills Contest, which will be held on Saturday, November 4th at the Jerome County Fairgrounds, in Jerome, Idaho. Check-in will begin at 8:30 AM with the various contest components starting promptly at 9:00 AM. The goal is to conclude no later than 2:00 PM to enable safe travel home.

This contest will include the Hunter Decision Making, Hunter Skills and Wildlife Identification/Management discipline events as found in the Idaho 4-H Shooting Sports rules (effective October 1, 2021); a copy can be found at <https://www.uidaho.edu/extension/4h/programs/shooting-sports/events>. Due to weather considerations and facilities, contestants will only shoot the archery component of the Hunter Decision Making event on November 4th.

Youth Registration & Equipment

A copy of the Youth Registration Form and Hunting Equipment Check-in Form is attached to this email, for your convenience. Please be sure to share this information with potentially interested youth and families with whom you work. You will note on the registration form that individuals must be currently enrolled in the 4-H Shooting Sports – Hunting project in order to participate.

All registration forms must be completely filled out (including coach and Extension verification sections) and mailed with the registration fee to the Jerome County Extension office, postmarked no later than October 27th. Any registrations postmarked after October 27th will not be accepted.

Participants are responsible for bringing all their required Archery equipment to this contest. They will turn in their Hunting Equipment Form and have their equipment inspected on November 4th, during the check-in process from 8:30 – 9:00 AM.


