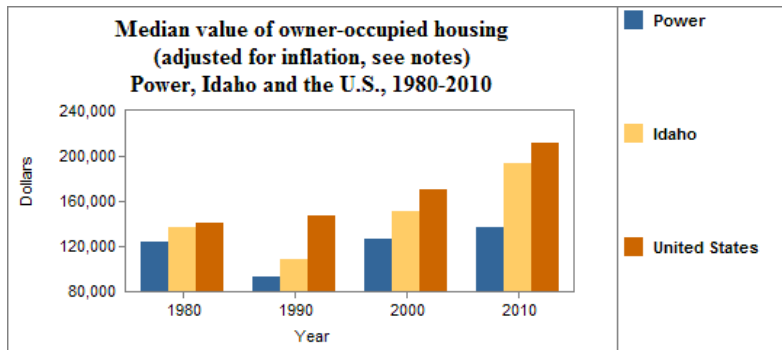


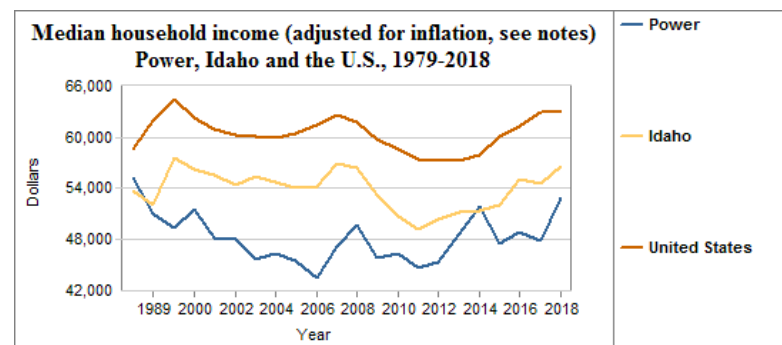
Housing

- ◆ The median value of owner-occupied housing (adjusted for inflation) was \$142,333 between 2014 and 2018, compared to \$195,784 in Idaho and \$208,613 in the US.
- ◆ The median value was the 36th highest out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2014 and 2018.
- ◆ The number of housing units increased by 5.7% from 2000 to 2018, compared to an increase of 34.8% in Idaho.



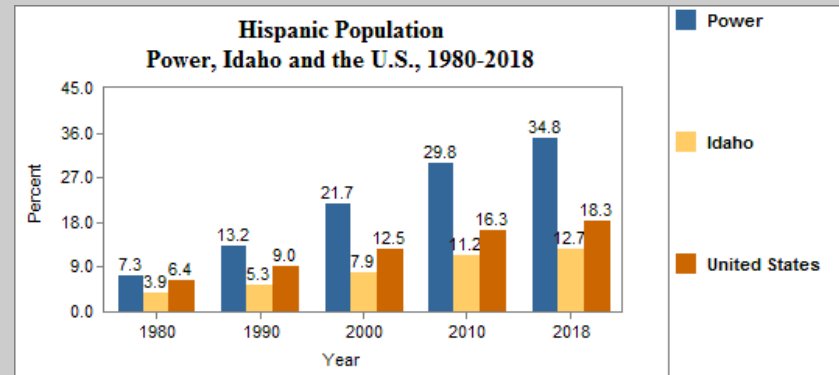
Income

- ◆ The county's per capita income in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$37,331, compared to the state average of \$44,696 and the national average of \$55,433.
- ◆ Per capita income increased by 9.6% from 2008 to 2018, compared to an increase of 15.3% in Idaho and an increase of 14.1% in the US.
- ◆ The median household income (adjusted for inflation) was \$52,862 in 2018 compared to \$56,530 in Idaho and \$63,059 in the US.



Hispanic Population

- ◆ Power County had 2,706 Hispanic residents in 2018.



Age Structure

- ◆ 31.2% of Power County's population was under 18 in 2018, in contrast to 25.5% in Idaho and 22.4% in the US.
- ◆ In 2018, 53.3% of the population was 18 to 64 years old, compared to 58.7% in Idaho and 61.5% in the US.
- ◆ Power County's median age in 2018 was 33.3 compared to 36.6 in Idaho and 38.2 in the US.

Note: The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of inflation. Using the CPI to put dollar values in "real" terms makes it easier to see "inflation-free" change over time. 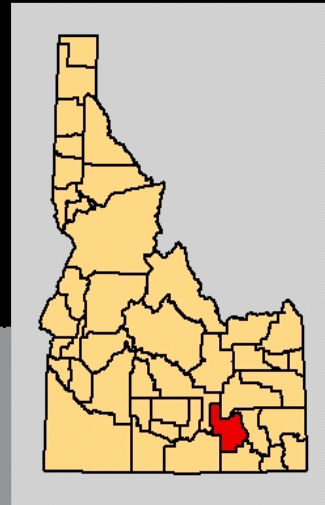

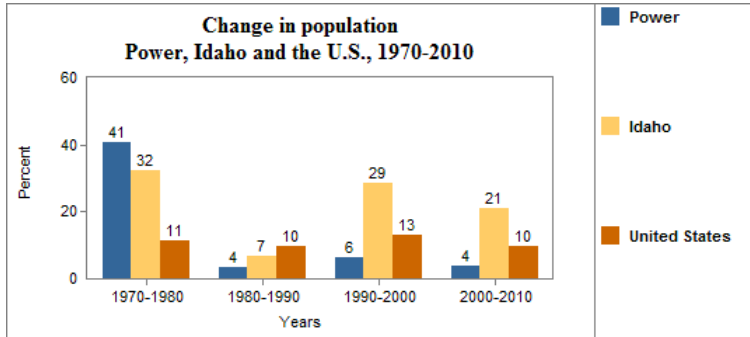
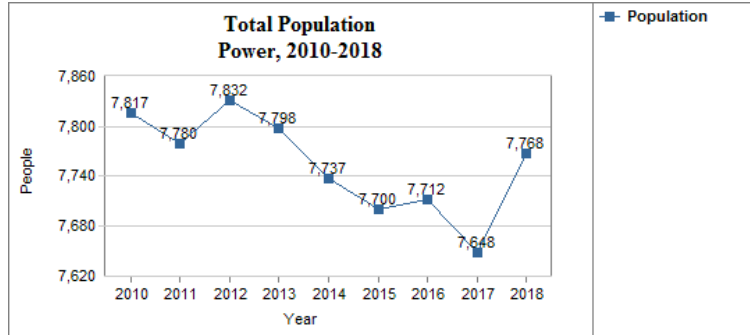
COUNTY HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Power County's total population in 2018 was 7,768.
- ◆ In 2018, the median household income was \$52,862.
- ◆ Power County's average annual unemployment rate was 2.9% in 2018.
- ◆ In 2018, Hispanic residents made up 34.8% of the population, compared to 12.7% in Idaho and 18.3% in the US.

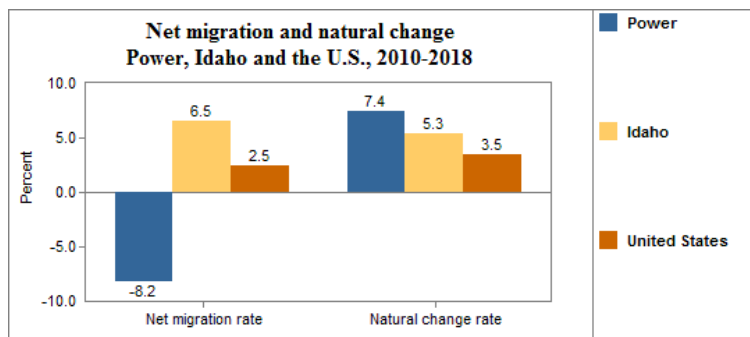


Population Change

- ◆ Power County had 7,768 residents in 2018, 49 less than 2010.
- ◆ Population decreased by 0.6 percent between 2010 and 2018, compared to an increase of 11.9 percent in Idaho as a whole.



- ◆ Power County was the 39th fastest growing county out of Idaho's 44 counties between 2010 and 2018.
- ◆ Since 1970, Power County has gained 2,904 residents.
- ◆ Power County had a migration rate below & natural change rate that was above the state average between 2010 and 2018.

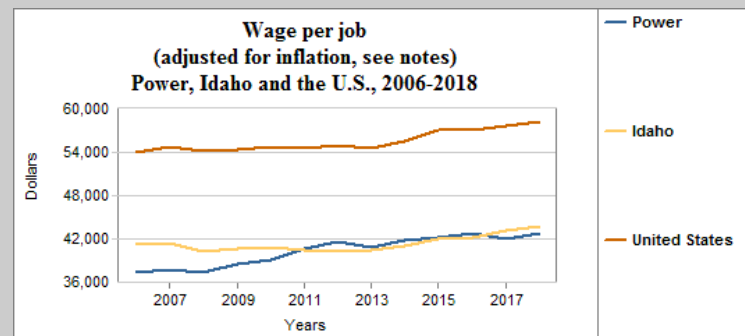


Employment

- ◆ The average annual unemployment rate in 2018 was 2.9%, compared to 2.8% for Idaho and 3.9% for the US. Power County ranked 23rd—from highest to lowest—out of Idaho's 44 counties.
- ◆ The largest number of jobs in 2018 were provided by manufacturing, farming, and government
- ◆ The number of jobs was 4,800 in 2018, compared to 3,948 in 1969—a 22% increase.

- ◆ In 2018, the self-employment rate was 21.5%, compared to 25.7% for Idaho and 23.1% for the US.
- ◆ The average wage per job in 2018 (adjusted for inflation) was \$42,775, up from \$37,412 a decade earlier. The average was \$43,659 in Idaho and \$58,304 in the US.



Social Trends

Educational Attainment

In Power County on average between 2014-2018...

- ◆ 19.1% of the population 25 years and older had no high school diploma, compared to 9.4% in Idaho and 12.3% in the US.
- ◆ 15.9% had a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 26.9% in Idaho and 31.5% in the US.

Poverty

- ◆ Power County's overall poverty rate decreased from 15.2% in 2008 when the recession began to 13.7% in 2018.
- ◆ Statewide, the overall poverty rate in 2018 was 11.7% and the US rate was 13.1%.
- ◆ Power County's child poverty rate (for people under 18) decreased from 21.9% in 2008 when the recession began to 19.4% in 2018.
- ◆ On average between 2014 and 2018, the poverty rate for people 65 and over was 4.0 percent.

Power County Youth

- ◆ The teen birth rate in 2017 was 12 per 1,000, compared to 6 per 1,000 in Idaho and 8 per 1,000 in the US.
- ◆ On average between 2014 and 2018, teens who were not working, looking for work, and not in school made up 4.5% of all youth aged 16-19, compared to 6.8% in Idaho and 6.8% in the US.

Crime and Law Enforcement

In Power County in 2018...

- ◆ The total number of crimes reported was 44 per 10,000 population, compared to 169 in Idaho and 258 in the US.
- ◆ The number of sworn police officers per 1,000 population was 2.1, compared to 1.6 in Idaho and 2.1 in the US.
