WHAT IS ORCID?

According to the ORCID help publication,
ORCID is an international, interdisciplinary,
open, non-proprietary, and not-for-profit
organization created by the research
community for the benefit of all
stakeholders, including you and the
organizations that support the research
ecosystem. ORCID's name was formed from
the acronym "Open Researcher and
Contributor IDentifier". ORCID provides a
persistent digital identifier (an ORCID iD) that
allows you to link your professional activities
by using your ORCID ID to link transactions.

WHY SHOULD I USE ORCID?

An ORCID ID uniquely identifies you as you, and, once you connect your ID to your publications and funding using ORCID's tools, ensures that research data systems both on campus and around the world correctly connect you to your research and scholarly output. ORCID also integrates with SciENcv to assist in creating biosketches and current and pending support forms with existing and/or linked data. SciENcv use is mandatory for National Science Foundation proposal submissions as of 10/23/2023.

HOW DOES THIS WORK IN PRACTICE?

Let's say you are authoring a paper. You've decided which journal you would like to publish it in. That journal will have a submission system, and you will submit your paper using a web form. That form asks you for all kinds of information: your name, your affiliation, contact information, your co-authors, etc. Journals are now also asking for your ORCID iD and are starting to pull information from your ORCID record - such as your affiliation, and related grants - that is being used to help you complete the submission form. On the other side, once your paper is accepted, the journal will include your ORCID iD in the published paper. Your iD is indexed in the major search platforms (such as Google, Scopus, Web of Science, WorldCat). Your iD is also used to update your ORCID record with the information about your paper (title, journal dates, and DOI). And the systems that connect to ORCID - like your university repository, and your funder reporting database - are automatically updated.

All you had to do was include your iD when you submitted the paper.

- Sign Up! If you don't have an ORCID ID, go here https://orcid.org/register to register for a new, free account. Make sure your affiliated with the U of I!
- Connect to U of I Once you have an account, visit https://orcid.uidaho.edu/ to connect your ORICD ID to the U of I integration.
- Fill out your ORCID profile Use ORCID's built in harvesting tools to start connecting your ID to your research output and awards.
- Look for future U of I developments The Library is replacing its current research information system with VERSO (Vandal Expertise, Research, and Scholarship Online) in the Spring! VERSO will be able to harvest your publications from a variety of sources and, with your permission, update your ORCID automatically.
