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Community Champions Collaborate for Food Waste Prevention Efforts in April



Extension Educator in Community Food Systems University of Idaho Extension, Teton County Driggs, Idaho (March 20, 2024)

Did you know the average household loses upwards of \$1,600 annually by throwing away uneaten food, yet one in five people lack consistent access to nutritious food?

Nearly 40% of food in the United Staes goes uneaten, leading to wasted resources and significant environmental damage from decomposing food and trash that release methane, a greenhouse gas 30 times more damaging than carbon dioxide. With a collective mission to prevent food waste, Teton Valley nonprofit organizations and community champions are partnering during Food Waste Prevention Week, April 1-7, 2024. Joining with over 600 organizations across the United States, Teton Food and Farm Coalition partner organizations are collaborating for a series of events and educational efforts throughout the month of April. Food Waste Prevention Week is a national program that was originally started by a teacher in Florida who did a cafeteria food waste audit. The campaign's efforts showcase that the average American can help tackle food waste with a few simple steps.

Drawn together by the Teton Food and Farm Coalition, this year's partners include the Community Resource Center of Teton Valley's Food for Good Program, University of Idaho Extension's Teton County 4-H and Master Gardener Programs, Mountain Roots Education, Rendezvous Upper Elementary School (RUES), Learning Academy of Teton Valley, Mountain Academy of Teton Science Schools, Teton Valley Food Pantry, Valley of the Tetons Library, Seniors West of the Tetons, Teton Valley Community Recycling, RAD Curbside, 460 Bread, and Roadhouse Brewery. Led by community champion and parent-volunteer Iris Saxer. RUES will kick off the community-wide efforts with a food waste audit of school breakfasts and lunches April 1-5th. Volunteers will coordinate the collection, sorting, and weighing of food and beverage waste. Data will be collected by day, grade, and weight and analyzed by students. Compostable food scraps will be collected for school garden programs. Curated food waste suitable for livestock such as pigs or chickens can also be collected if a farmer partner wants to become involved. Additional food waste audits will be conducted throughout the month at the Learning Academy of Teton Valley, Mountain Academy, and the Seniors West of the Tetons.

Other regional happenings include a "Bread-to-Tap" event at Roadhouse Brewery Pub and Eatery in Jackson. 460 Bread and Roadhouse are partnering to brew beer made from bread waste. Brewing began on March 8th with anticipation that the beer will be on tap at Roadhouse the first week of April. A portion of proceeds from the Bread-to-Tap Brew will be donated to Teton Valley Food Pantry.

Throughout April, the importance of preventing food waste will be highlighted, including solutions to prevent food waste, helping to reduce food insecurity and environmental damage. A youth art contest will be held with area schools

and 4-H, with local winners of the contest showcased at the community-wide Earth Day celebration at the Teton County Fairgrounds on April 20th. Composting demonstrations and results of the food waste audits will be showcased at the Earth Day celebration. From social media educational campaigns, art contests, webinars, and service opportunities to teaching resources, inperson events, and more, Food Waste Prevention Week 2024 offers a way for everyone to get involved in promoting food waste awareness and education.

 \cdot Save leftovers and store/freeze food in portion-ready containers

 \cdot Cook and serve only what is needed for that meal

· Menu plan and stick to shopping lists

· Buy smaller quantities

· Don't shop hungry

· Share excess with others

 \cdot Compost and/or feed food scraps to live-stock

- · 8 whole wheat tortillas
- 1 cup low-fat cheddar cheese, shredded .
- 1 cup spinach fresh .

FOOD WASTE

WHAT IS FOOD WASTE?


Food waste occurs when food is uneaten and thrown away.

The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) estimates that about one-third of all food produced in the world each year is wasted.

According to the nonprofit group ReFED, in the U.S. alone, food waste consumes about 21% of all fresh water and 18% of available cropland space each year.



A 2017 report from the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) states that the number of calories wasted in the United States each year could, in theory, fully feed about **150,000,000** people.



Food is the **number-one** material sent to landfills in the United States, ahead of plastics and paper products.



Food waste occurs at all points in the **supply chain**, but according to ReFED, most food waste occurs in the home (43% by weight), with restaurants and grocery stores (40%) a close second; about 16% of food waste occurs on farms, and about 2% occurs in processing and distribution.

TIPS FOR REDUCING FOOD WASTE IN THE HOME



Keep track of what's in your refrigerator and cupboards to avoid buying food items you already have.

Plan your weekly meals before shopping to avoid buying items you might not eat.





Choose "imperfect" fruits and vegetables that others might overlook due to their appearance.

Another option is to **donate any** extra food to feed hungry people through food banks or shelters.



Research the best ways to store perishable food items to ensure they stay fresh for as long as possible; the United States Department of Agriculture has even developed an app called the FoodKeeper to help (https://www.foodsafety.gov/keep-food-safe/foodkeeper-app), and food storage tips can also be found at https://savethefood.com.

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Learn how to interpret food product dating a significant amount of household food waste occurs because consumers throw out "expired" food that is still edible.

Using food scraps to feed animals is also a strategy to ensure food doesn't go to waste.




If all else fails, food waste for **composting or for industrial purposes** should also be considered before placing waste in a landfill. or incinerating it.





Young People Want Guidance From Adults On Use Of AI Tools, Says First-Of-Its-Kind Survey From National 4-H Council

WASHINGTON, DC (February 29, 2024) – National 4-H Council today released **a survey** that explores young people's knowledge and use of artificial intelligence (AI) technology, specifically generative AI tools such as ChatGPT. The survey shows that while most young people (66%) express at least some understanding of what generative AI is and how it can be used, many kids (72%) are also seeking support from adults in learning how to use these tools correctly and with confidence.

The survey, the first of its kind to include responses from both tweens and teenagers (ages 9-17), also finds that young people are broadly optimistic about the potential of generative AI for their education and careers. A strong majority of respondents (64%) agreed that generative AI will help them learn things that they will need to know in their future careers, and 58% said it would help them improve how they learn at school. However, respondents also have concerns about AI, including how the technology could be used for cheating (61%) or to expose private information about them (53%).

The survey, which included 1,510 children ages 9-17, was fielded from November 5-16, 2023 by Hart Research and supported by Microsoft.

"As America's largest youth development organization, 4-H has an important role to play in educating youth about generative AI. Preparing young people for the workforce of the future means ensuring that they have a solid understanding of these new technologies that are reshaping our world," said **Jill Bramble, President and CEO of National 4-H Council.** "We are focused on meeting this need through educational content on CLOVER, our new digital learning platform, and through 4-H's Cooperative Extension in-person programs."

Additional findings from the survey include:

- Most kids say they know something about generative AI, but this knowledge is limited. Among all youth surveyed, 34% said they know "a great deal" or "a fair amount" about generative AI, while an equal number said they know "very little" or "nothing at all." 32% said they know at least some about generative AI.
- Kids want adults involved in learning how to use and engage with the Al tools they have used or might use in their lives. Over seven in 10 kids (72%) that use Al would like at least some help from adults in learning how to use different tools. This number was particularly high among younger children (84% of 9-12 year olds, compared to 63% of 13-17 year olds.)
- Young people involved in 4-H are particularly likely to have used generative AI. 60% of 4-Hers say they have used generative AI tools like ChatGPT, compared to 50% of all boys and 44% of all girls. This marks one of the highest totals among all sub-groups measured.
- There are notable differences regarding generative AI understanding and use along demographic lines:
- ⇒ In terms of race and ethnicity, Black and Latino kids (74% and 67%) are more likely than White kids (60%) to see the positive impact of AI on their education and career.
- ⇒ High school boys are the most likely to express a strong understanding of generative AI (43%), while girls in elementary school are the least likely (22%.)
- ⇒ While 38% of urban kids and 36% of suburban kids say they know a great deal or fair amount about generative AI, that number drops to 28% among rural children.

"Like with any new technology, we need to educate, empower and equip young people with the necessary skills to use generative AI in a responsible way," said **Courtney Gregoire, Chief Digital Safety Officer at Microsoft.** "4-H's find-ings help us all understand how youth are using these new tools. We welcome these insights as we continue to evolve our approach and provide additional resources to those who need them."

The survey was designed and reviewed in a process involving experts from 4-H and University of California-Irvine. The survey was preceded by ten cognitive interviews with children within the target age group in October 2023 to test and refine the survey instrument. Children ages 9-12 were recruited exclusively through invitations sent initially to their parents or caregivers asking permission for them to participate. Children ages 13-17 were recruited directly.

To help children, educators and caregivers navigate conversations around generative AI, Microsoft recently released two new resources: a <u>Family Safety Toolkit</u>, which provides tips to caregivers on how to have conversations with children about generative AI, and a <u>Classroom Toolkit</u>, to equip educators with instructional information to create an immersive and effective learning experience with generative AI for students aged 13-15 years. 

4-H Teton Livestock Club hosted a livestock skill-a-thon at the fairgrounds on March 4, 2024. Due to the bad weather many families were not able to attend, but for the ones that did brave the storm, fun was had by all. Skill-a-thons are designed for hands on learning while learning to problem solve and work as a team member. It was great for kids in different clubs to interact, work as team members and see older youth helping younger members.

Learning Stations

 4-H Pledge and 4-H knowledge: It's important that all 4-H youth know the 4-H pledge and what it means. If you stay in 4-H very long it will become something that you can use to become a better person. <u>"I Pledge my Head to</u> <u>clearer thinking, my Heart to greater</u> <u>loyalty, my Hands to larger service,</u> <u>and my Health to better living for my</u> <u>club, my community, my county and</u> <u>my world."</u> As leaders we feal that it's important for youth to have



knowledge about 4-H. Examples are: What do the colors green and white stand for? What year did 4-H start? Who is the Extension Educator for our county? And more.

• Breeds: It's important for youth to know the breeds of their project. It's important to know where their breed originated and how we use



them today. Every breed can offer something different to youth depending on how they are using that breed. Some breeds are better for milking ability, mothering traits, larger litters, better marbling in meat, calmer, faster maturing, while some breeds are know for more meat. Youth would pick breeds for projects depending on if they are doing breeding, dairy or market projects.

- Parts: Parts of the animal are very important to learn. This is one question that livestock judges usually ask at a show. Kids would then point out that part of the animal to the judge. Judges might also ask what the youth likes about that part of their animal or what they might change about that part. When picking a project for 4-H and fair kids need to know about width of loin, twist and chest, correct slope of the shoulder, is the neck of animal too fat, is the animals underline straight or is udder good for breeding. To answer these question youth would need to know the parts of their animal. If an animal is injured it is very important to tell the veterinarian were the injury is located.
- Meat Tasting: At the fair we sell five different species of animals and some members have not tasted meat from their species. We filled crock pots with leg of lamb, leg of goat, beef rump roast and pork roast.

We had members taste from each crock pot and asked them to identify the species of meat that they were eating. The kids learned that they do like lamb and goat, as it is a meat that most people don't eat a lot of. It should be a talking point when youth are inviting buyers to the 4-H/FFA Jr. Livestock sale to say "I'm raising a lamb and lamb meat is really good."

- Price is Right: The "Price is Right" station was for youth to learn about products and the prices of those items needed for their livestock project. Parents often purchases equipment and members don't realize how much they are spending on their projects. Beef kids learned that it's going to cost about \$80.00 for a show halter. Noramectin (worming medication) is \$35.00 a bottle. The game had items anywhere from \$2.99 up to \$539.00 and these are expenses on top of the purchase their animal. The game also taught youth that these expenses need to be listed in their record books.
- Meat Judging: This station was to help kids learn to identify species, cuts of meat, by size, shape, color, bones and more. Youth judged pork chops, lamb loin, goat loin, and beef rib steaks. Youth learned how to fill out judging cards while using their decision making skills to place the classes. Judging is a great way for youth to learn communication skills by explaining why they judged the class the way they did. Livestock judging may give youth an opportunity at college on scholarship programs. Judging is also a life skill used in everyday activities.

Kids voted for their favorite, easiest and most learned station. We also ask for new ideas for stations. We want to thank all the leaders and parents that helped put this on, it takes an army. Also, thanks to Mistie Hansen, Chandler Sachse, Regina Beard, and Mckenna Beard for donating the meat and cooking it. One leader said that we should do this every month. A parent who purchased a goat at the 4-H/FFA Jr. Livestock sale in 2023, tried the goat and was surprised how good it was. Now she is planning to use that goat for family meals.

4-H Parents, youth and friends, are encouraged to bring a special homemade dessert for the dessert auction. What a great way to show off Grandma's favorite pie recipe!


